A TITANIC TIME

On April 14, 1912, a massive ocean liner was making its voyage through the frigid waters of the North Atlantic Sea. Just four days prior, this "unsinkable" ship started its maiden voyage from Southampton, England to New York City. It never arrived. The ship's captain knew they were passing through iceberg laden waters, and he had placed two men as lookout in the crow's nest, high atop the ship's foremast. At around 11:40pm, to the starboard side, they saw a dark mass that blocked the stars. It was a massive iceberg. It was too late. Hidden beneath the surface of the water, ice from the base of the iceberg cut through the hull, flooding multiple water-tight compartments. The "unsinkable" Titanic sank to the bottom of the sea just four hours later, bringing over 1,500 of the crew and passengers with it.

I thought of this tragedy last month while attending our synod's Fall Theological Conference at Pere Marquette, a time for clergy to gather for education and renewal. The theme of the conference was "Remembering the body of Christ: Theological and Pastoral Formation in a Polarized World." Our guest presenter, Rev. Sunitha Mortha, a third generation Lutheran from India, shared about the clash of cultures she experienced when she moved to Minneapolis. She projected on the screen two icebergs representing two cultures. Above the water are the external aspects of the culture experienced by the five senses: cooking, dress, music, and literature. But remember, 90% of an iceberg lies beneath the This mass of internal culture contains hidden values and influences: notions of modesty, justice, beauty, and governing.


These icebergs represent us. We see one another's behaviors and practices, but fail to consider the values and stories beneath the surface. We see someone who votes differently, worships differently, or thinks differently and conclude, "If they only knew what I know, they would know that I'm right and not do that." Not so. There is great complexity buoyed by that 90% beneath the surface, and when we ignore it, we collide and are in danger of sinking.

Rev. Mortha shared this as a lesson of inclusion in the church, that the Body of Christ is like an arranged marriage in India. We don't get to pick who is in our family, but we love them and work to get along. The corollary is obvious for the rest of our lives. I had the opportunity to visit with many colleagues while eating, hiking, and playing frisbee golf, and the conversation always came back to frustration and futility about the political divide we are experiencing in our country and congregations. Surprisingly (perhaps not) the most volatile situations occurred on social media where congregation members engaged in battle and, in one instance, called for the removal of their pastor.

These are dangerous times. The differences are complicated. The people at odds with one another, along with their values and culture, are complicated. I can urge us all to love one another, and some would call for my ouster as well. This challenge doesn't come from me, it comes from the gospel. The gospel of Jesus Christ proclaims that there is neither Jew or Gentile, slave or free, male or female, (any others we could add?)... we are one in Christ Jesus (Galatians 3:28). We are loved into the Body of Christ, not because of who we are, but because of who God is. It's time that we acknowledge the complexities, listen to one another, and love one another.

OVER \$363,000 IN PLEDGES TO OUR ABIDING IN FAITH FOR OUR FUTURE APPEAL RECEIVED... THANK YOU!

We had set a goal of \$400,000 over three years to pay off our mortgage and received pledges for over \$363,000! It's clear that September 14 was more than a time to dedicate our pledges, but also to dedicate ourselves to God and God's ministry. The goal of stewardship ministry is to practice the spiritual discipline of stewardship as we grow in our relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents, and finances God has entrusted to us. Stewardship Snapshot... Mortgage Interest

With the wonderful response to our three-year Abiding in Faith for Our Future campaign to pay off our mortgage, some have been asking about our interest payments. We pay monthly mortgage payments of \$4,503.25. With our September 24 payment, \$1,370.47 went toward interest. Donations for our appeal cover our monthly payments, then go directly to the loan principle, significantly lowering that interest payment over time. If you have made a pledge for 2026, consider giving it in January to lower that interest payment even more. Thank you for your generous practice of stewardship!
