

LIFEGROUP DISCUSSION GUIDE



SUMMARY

This sermon from 2 Peter 3 addresses the danger of spiritual procrastination and the importance of actively engaging our neighbors with the gospel. JMT warns against listening to 'scoffers' who dismiss the urgency of Christ's return and instead encourage believers to live with the end in mind. He emphasizes that God's patience in delaying His return is an opportunity for more people to come to repentance, not an excuse to delay our mission. The message challenges believers to examine how their neighbors are impacted by their faith in Jesus, using a practical framework of character, chemistry, competence, and credibility. Rather than waiting for crises to bring people to faith, Christians should think like farmers - investing long-term effort in building genuine relationships with neighbors while being prepared to share the gospel. The sermon concludes with practical suggestions for neighborhood engagement, including participating in community events and serving opportunities.

INTRO PRAYER

Heavenly Father, as we gather together to study Your Word, we ask that You would open our hearts and minds to what You want to teach us today. ICE BREAKER

What's one thing you tend to procrastinate on the most, and what usually motivates you to finally get it done?

QUESTIONS

- What are some 'scoffer voices' in our culture today that might cause us to spiritually procrastinate or lose urgency about Christ's return?
- How does understanding that 'with the Lord a day is like a thousand years' change your perspective on God's timing versus human timing?
- JMT mentioned putting 'big rocks in first' - what are the 'big rocks' (most important things) that should take priority in your spiritual life?
- When you honestly assess your reputation with your neighbors, what do you think they would say about you? How might this impact their view of Christianity?
- What's the difference between waiting for a crisis to share your faith versus building long-term relationships like a farmer? Which approach do you tend to use?
- How can we balance being 'gospel ready' (able to talk about Jesus) with being genuinely interested in knowing our neighbors as people?
- What are some practical ways we can show our neighbors that we are 'for them' and genuinely care about their lives?
- How might participating in community events or serving opportunities help us build credibility in our neighborhoods?

Life Application

This week, choose one specific action to begin building a long-term relationship with a neighbor. This could be introducing yourself to someone you haven't met, starting to pray regularly for your neighbors by name, participating in a community event, or simply having a genuine conversation with someone you already know. Focus on being genuinely interested in them as a person, not just as someone to evangelize.
