

LIFEGROUP DISCUSSION GUIDE



SUMMARY

A challenging message from Psalm 52, exploring how believers should practice the prophetic voice of Jesus. The psalm addresses a 'mighty man' who boasts in evil, contrasting human power with God's steadfast love. John Mark structured the message around 3 movements: confronting the powerful who mistreat others, praying differently for justice, and investing in a flourishing community of saints. Rather than being impressed by wealth, power, or good presentations, believers should see through to the heart of those who use their position to harm others. The pastor challenged the congregation to examine their own lives, noting that American politics and wealth can distract from following Jesus. He concluded by having the congregation read Psalm 52 aloud together, practicing speaking with the prophetic voice of Jesus.

INTRO PRAYER

Heavenly Father, as we gather together in this small group, we ask that You would open our hearts and minds to what You want to teach us today. Help us to be honest with ourselves and with each other as we explore Your Word. Give us courage to hear difficult truths and wisdom to apply them to our lives. We pray that Your Holy Spirit would guide our discussion and that we would leave here changed and more committed to following Jesus. May we not just be hearers of Your Word, but doers also. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

ICE BREAKER

What's your opinion on when it's appropriate to start playing Christmas music, and why do you feel that way?

KEY VERSES

- Psalm 52:1

QUESTIONS

- Pastor John Mark said we can be 'mesmerized by a good presentation' and miss when someone is actually a bully or causing harm. Can you think of a time when you were impressed by someone's appearance or speaking ability but later realized their character didn't match?
- The sermon mentioned that Psalm 52 would help us 'identify the powerful who mistreat others.' What are some signs we should look for to recognize when someone is using their position to harm rather than serve?
- How do you think American culture's focus on wealth and power makes it harder for Christians to follow Jesus and care about justice?
- The pastor asked an uncomfortable question: 'When was the last time you realized you were harming other people?' How would you answer that question, and why might it be important to ask ourselves this regularly?
- Psalm 52 calls us to confront physical and spiritual injustice. What's the difference between these two types of injustice, and how might we address each?
- The sermon suggested that middle-class and wealthy people might be afraid to ask if God will really take care of them if they use their resources only to serve others. What fears do you have about trusting God completely with your security?
- How can we create a 'flourishing community of saints' where people experience 'a little bit of heaven now' rather than the brokenness they find in the world?
- What does it mean practically to 'hope in the name of Jesus' and use His authority to make a difference in our present circumstances?

Life Application

This week, practice using the 'prophetic voice of Jesus' by identifying one situation in your sphere of influence where someone is being mistreated or where injustice is occurring. Instead of staying silent or looking the other way, take one concrete action to speak up or intervene - whether that's having a difficult conversation, reporting a problem, or simply offering support to someone who is vulnerable. Before you act, spend time in prayer asking God for wisdom and courage, and remember that you're representing Jesus in this situation.
