

Land Acknowledgement

Although we have come together in this Cathedral Church of All Saints in Halifax, Nova Scotia, we each stand in place on solid ground that is the ancestral territory of peoples who were here long before the Europeans crossed the ocean. We gather at this Cathedral which is located on the unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq people. We also recognize that African Nova Scotians are a distinct people whose histories, legacies, and contributions have enriched this part of Mi'kma'ki for over 400 years.

LIGHTING OF THE 1ST ADVENT CANDLE

The tradition of the Advent Wreath comes from France and Germany, which is why it is often made of evergreen branches, a symbol of God's ever-lively love in the midst of the northern winter. The Season of Advent is a season of waiting, longing, promise, and preparation. Advent is a reminder that we live in the "not yet" time. The candles week by week form a growing circle of light in anticipation of the birth of Jesus, the Light of the world.

Week 1: Hope



Reader: The Prophet Isaiah proclaims to the people of his day a word of **Hope**. Despite wars and hardships that have left the people of Israel in his day broken, fearful and in despair, God says; "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, nei-

ther shall they learn war any more."

Reader: In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells us to be prepared. "Be ready for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."

Reader: As we light this first candle of our Advent Wreath we do so as a sign of **Hope.** [*The first candle is lit*] To hope is to seek the glimmer of light in the darkness.

Reader: We hold in our hands the ability to bring forth light or extinguish its glow.

People: May we through our lives and actions share the light of hope. May we hold it high to light the way for others, as we light our own pathway.






The Gospel

All stand for the Gospel.

But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore, you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour. — *Matthew* 24:36-44




