## Guiding Vision:

As called by Christ to move beyond our comfort zones and take our spiritual gifts out into the world, and as a PC(USA) Matthew 25 congregation, we recognize the faith journey of each of us is enriched by our ministry and service to others in need in Winchester and beyond. Further, as a PC(USA) Creation Care congregation we affirm that our mission extends to the healing of all of God's creation.

## Guiding Principles:

- Continually seek God's direction for supporting FPC's mission involvement both near and far.
- Recognize that effective ministry goes beyond providing funding to include giving time, talents, and resources.
- Strive to employ good mission practices; i.e., practices that are collaborative and non-transactional, and where we can build relationships with partners.
- Nurture the faith journeys of our congregation by offering opportunities for mission outreach and growing disciples that include intergenerational activities for children and youth..
  - Make special efforts to develop inter-generational mission activities, including children and youth.
- Give special emphasis to opportunities for mission in the greater Winchester area.
- Recognize that ministry of presence is a legitimate mission outreach.
- Promote and share with the congregation our ministry as a Matthew 25 Congregation that advocates to reduce human suffering. This means a focus on the following three points:
  - building congregational vitality,
  - dismantling structural racism, and
  - eradicating systemic poverty.
- As an Earth Care Congregation, we promote and support good environmental stewardship, this includes reducing our carbon footprint.
- Support local peacemaking initiatives and promote the PC(USA) Peace & Global Witness annual special offering.
- Review these Guiding Principles at least annually and evaluate our suite of outreach projects at the beginning of each budget cycle.

The meal had been sit down and delivery. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, only take-out and home delivery are available.

The CTD operates solely with volunteers and donations.

CCAP is a community lifeline for all people in our area who find themselves struggling to meet basic needs, providing stability and security while enabling them find paths to self-sufficiency. CCAP was formed in October of 1974 by eleven local churches as the Christian Cooperative Action Program. We then changed our name to Congregational Community Action Project in 1975 to broaden our reach to encompass more need.

FPC Mission council interacts with officers and staff of IBS and our partner congregations in Mettu, as well as the national church in Addis Ababa.

"The Ethiopian Partnership falls under the Committee on Mission and Outreach (CMO). Through CMO, the Partnership is charged with the following responsibilities:

1. Preparing prayer requests for regular prayer for our Partner Synod.
2. Planning visits and interactions with the partners.
3. Serving as a link to missionaries from Shenandoah Presbytery to Illubabor.
4. Providing information and publicity about the Partnership utilizing Partnership web site and Presbytery communication tools.
5. Making budget requests to support these efforts and monitoring the expenditures.
6. Plan regular celebrations of the Partnership."

*Support community theater as a way to help members learn about domestic violence and access to health care.*

Established in 2009.

The mission of the Faith Stories Project and Colectivo Teatral Historias de Fe (Faith Stories Theatre Collective) is to empower women in Guatemala and the U.S. by artistically exploring the complexities of how faith affects their lives. It provides a space where women can share their stories and participate in the creation of a collaboratively devised work based on those stories. It allows for mutual support and encouragement, building self-esteem, and creating a sense of community for women of faith in both countries as we struggle to tear down barriers and explore how we are more alike than different.

In 2025, five members of FPC travelled to Guatemala to support the Faith Stories Project.

A trip is planned for early 2026.

## OBJECTIVE

1. Determine progress, and challenges to the growth of the program.
2. Provide training support for community theater performance-for the Theater Company regarding community issues.
3. Support a "Ministry of Presence" for the women in Guatemala.

## IMPACT

- 7 different communities participate in the theater company activities.
- 6 women have had their phone plans sponsored for the year 2025.

Operational since the early 1990's starting with a single donor.

FPC is working together with Faithworks, Congregational Action Project(C-CAP) and Highland Food Pantry to coordinate and increase this family assistance. HF monies go directly to third party providers. The HF is now part of the mission outreach legacy of FPC and has been meeting the emergency needs of many in our community.

Clients are tracked and allowed to seek assistance once per year for three years before reaching their limit of assistance.

# HIGHLAND FOOD PANTRY



## ABOUT

*Provide food and other assistance to those in need and engage our community in the fight to end hunger.*

Operational since 1980. Currently a Non-for profit with a Board.  
Primary Coordination- FPC.

A member agency of the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank network, Highland Food Pantry of Winchester, Virginia serves people in the northern Shenandoah Valley experiencing chronic hunger. Our main activity is the distribution of food to individuals and families in need. We are a United Way partner. Highland Food Pantry envisions ending hunger in the northern Shenandoah Valley. We are partnering with the Winchester Comprehensive Treatment Center to provide their patients (those living in cars or motels) food once a month. The Annual Fundraiser is the Men on a Mission event.

In 2024, HFP partnered with the Winchester/Frederick County Health Department and offered free flu shots to all of our clients for a month

- Court Ordered Community Service Opportunities.
- Integration of Youth and Seniors as volunteer help.
- Food for patients of the Winchester Comprehensive Treatment Center (methadone treatment center) on a monthly basis.
- Emergency aid for families who have hit a crisis point.

## IMPACT

- In 2024:**
- # of families/individuals in the program = 10,098 (2024) # of households participating = 31,852
  - # of delivered food boxes to seniors in need = 200+ (each month)
  - Highland provided Emergency Financial Assistance to 331 clients which totaled \$ 38,037.85
  - According to the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank and the Feeding America guidelines, we multiply the weight by \$1.94 per pound to come up with the monetary value. In 2024, that value was \$1,645,072 worth of food that came into and out of the pantry.
  - # of delivered food boxes to families through Family Promise = 17 (each month)
  - We have partnered with the Salvation Army to provide 135 food boxes for families that the Salvation Army provided Christmas for

# JUBILEE KITCHEN



## ABOUT

*Serve Saturday meals for those in the community who are food insecure or want a community meal.*

Est. 1994

Jubilee Kitchen offers free lunch year-round on Saturdays in the fellowship hall of First Presbyterian Church. Our congregation supplies volunteers for this ministry every first Saturday.

Lunch is typically a sit down meal starting at 11:30 am in the Fellowship Hall off of the Loudoun street walking mall.

## OBJECTIVE

Serve meals for guests every Saturday over a period of 52 weeks of the year.

Apple Blossom Saturday and the Saturday following Thanksgiving are the two holidays the kitchen is closed.

## IMPACT

- Served 1,955 meals (including seconds) to over 1,400 guests
- Donated meals, when not used, to William and Henry Evans Home for Children and also to the Warming Center.
- Served meals for 49 of the 52 Saturdays this past year
- Jubilee Kitchen is truly a community effort utilizing over 450 volunteers from 8 community organizations who have provided in excess of 1700 hours of volunteer service in 2024.

First Presbyterian's Refugee Resettlement team works with Church World Service in Winchester. Although the overall volunteer team is ecumenical and includes many members of the community, FPC volunteers have been faithfully engaged in this work.

- Initiated by Grace Lutheran and expanded to FPC and other churches.

### OBJECTIVE

To Provide:

- Coordination of housing in partnership with CWS.
- Provide transportation for moving furniture and individual refugee needs ( Dr. appointments, food).
- FPC provides Basic Pantry supplies, Welcome Meal for new homes, and assists with transportation (furniture moving and individual needs).
- *CWS provides housing, cultural orientations, transportation and English language services.*

### IMPACT

- 125 individuals to date; 400 individuals currently living in Winchester
- Valley Haven Furniture Bank provides furniture to homeless and refugee populations.
- Provides groceries and small household items for arriving refugees.
- Provided transportation and English language tutoring for over 125 individuals and families who have arrived in the last year

# SHERANDO FOOD PANTRY



## ABOUT

*Serve those in our community who are food insecure*

Operational since 2019.

USDA certified and affiliated with the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank. SFP provides clients with food purchased by or donated to the Pantry. Currently serving clients from Frederick, Shenandoah, and Clarke County in Virginia, and neighboring counties in West Virginia.

## OBJECTIVE

Provide food to families that are food insecure.

- Two evenings /month 1st and 3rd Thursday.
  - Families are able to choose their preferences.

## IMPACT

- Approximately 20-25 families per week and 70-84 families per month
- In 2024, we served 176 families comprised of 645 individuals. We distributed 14,740 pounds of food.
- December 19th, we gave each family a donated Christmas dinner box consisting of a whole turkey and all of the ingredients for a traditional Christmas dinner.



# WEEKDAY SCHOOL



## ABOUT

*Provide child-directed, teacher-nurtured learning experiences in a Christian environment*

Established in 1947, approved by Session on September 8th , opening on November 3rd for class.

The Weekday School is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children. This organization calls on our teachers to use their knowledge of child development to create a developmentally appropriate learning environment. The staff strives to meet each child at his/her current level of cognitive, language, physical, social and spiritual development.

## OBJECTIVE

The mission of the Weekday School is to provide child-directed, teacher-nurtured learning experiences in a Christian environment, supporting each child's unique growth and development through best practices in Early Childhood Education. Our dedicated teaching staff designs intentional, enriching experiences to meet students' needs using the Creative Curriculum, which encourages learning through guided play, exploration, and thoughtful teacher interaction during individual, small, and large group activities.

We also integrate Conscious Discipline, a trauma-informed, evidence-based approach that empowers teachers and children to build emotional intelligence through connection and relationship-based teaching. Rooted in brain research, this philosophy helps create a safe, supportive, and caring classroom community where all children can thrive.

## IMPACT

- On average, over 100 students attend the weekday school every year.
- \$5,800 raised in scholarships for students during the annual Spaghetti Dinner Fundraiser in April of 2025.

# WINCHESTER AREA TEMPORARY TRANSITIONAL SHELTER (WATTS)



## ABOUT

*To break the cycle of homelessness one life at a time, we empower individuals to re-enter the workforce and connect individuals to the resources needed to be as self-sufficient as possible while providing a safe, temporary shelter during extreme weather.*

Operational since 2008.

WATTS (501-C3) provides case workers and services as needed.

WATTS is a low-barrier shelter, meaning they will take ANYONE who is homeless, regardless of sobriety or criminal background; they seek to eliminate the "barriers" that prevent guests from entering other shelters and simply get them off the streets. For this reason, the shelter is for ADULTS ONLY and all volunteers must be at least 18 YEARS OF AGE.

## OBJECTIVE

To Provide:

- Day-night shelter, safety, and security for the homeless for 21 weeks between November and March- the coldest months of the year.
- Meals (grab and go breakfast, hot dinner, and snacks).
- Showers and Hygiene products.
- Basic Medical Care (BP, first Aid, referrals).
- Social Activities and Enrichment (bingo, television, etc).

## IMPACT

- Winter months: 35 guests (adults) for 7 days over 21 weeks at various locations.
- Summer months: Cooling Shelter for a few weeks. 12 - 5pm Mon-Sat. \*Sundays 1pm-5pm. Summer site varies. (not on FPC's campus)
- Approximately 250 volunteers for the week hosted at FPC for at total of 400+ hours of service - including food preparation/service, medical, security/safety

# ADDITIONAL FPC SUPPORTED MISSIONS



Fremont Street Nursery opened its door in 1943 to care for the children of mothers who had gone to work to support their families during World War II.
