Greetings Fellow Lenten Journeyers,

The season of Lent always feels like a time of two different things being held in tension: we know that Holy Week and Easter are coming around the corner, but we wait and journey slowly through the 40 days (plus Sundays). The term “Lent” comes from the Old English word *lencten*, which referred to the “lengthening” of the daylight hours during spring. Here in Iowa, the days continue to feel longer, but if you’re like me, it still feels like there’s not quite enough time to get everything done.

This duality is perhaps felt especially strongly in a year like this when Easter comes on the later end of the calendar – April 20. We had a fairly late Ash Wednesday and start to our Lenten season because of that, and the rest of this church year will all feel a little later, because of that. It’s seen in the Easter candy and eggs around at stores (and even in our fellowship hall): people want to get to the joy of Easter! We want the happy ending, and we’d rather skip past the slow walk through temptations, death, grief, and all the rest that our church year points us to during Lent.

I think it’s fairly easy to see why that might be: people love to feel that joy! Some of the favorite hymns of the worship and music committee (for one example) are all of the ones we sing during Easter Sunday and the season of Eastertide that follows: “Christ is Risen!” we shout and sing with exuberance. Last year, Easter Sunday was our largest attendance at any Sunday, and Maundy Thursday and Good Friday before it were some of the least-attended. There are perhaps a great many reasons for this too: people are busy, the services on those evenings are at 7 PM so it’s hard for those with young children or older members who don’t like driving at night to attend, and sometimes family has arrived in town and people just want to spend time with them before getting into the joy of Easter Sunday.

If we go through life skipping to the joy at the end of the story, perhaps it loses some of the luster. I don’t intend this to guilt everyone into attending the Holy Week worship services, but what ways do we still need to see the story the whole way through to enjoy the joyous ending. Many of life’s greatest joys come after some period of great waiting and transformation: pregnancy before childbirth, packing and preparing before a new home, and recovery after a surgery before the proverbial new lease on life. From our own Ash Wednesday worship liturgy, we hear these words in the invitation to Lent:

“We begin this holy season by acknowledging our need for repentance and for God’s mercy. We are created to experience joy in communion with God, to love one another, and to live in harmony with creation. But our sinful rebellion separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, so that we do not enjoy the life our creator intended.” (Invitation to Lent, Ash Wednesday, ELW p. 252)

Without the living Christ, we would not have one who could die for our sins. Without the One who dies for our sins, we would not have a God who has overcome death and the grave and been raised, showing for us a new life in Christ. Without that new life in Christ, we would lack the centering of our baptismal identity, our need to gather for communion would be less, and our life together would end up less joyful. For all the joy that we look ahead to on Easter, we need the journey through Lent to make it matter that much more.

I hope that you’ll join me in all the ways that our congregation lives out life together in these last few weeks of Lent, Holy Week, and awaits the Easter joy ahead. When we get to that Sunday morning, there will be the greatest reminder of God’s grace we could ever hope: the empty tomb!

President's Message

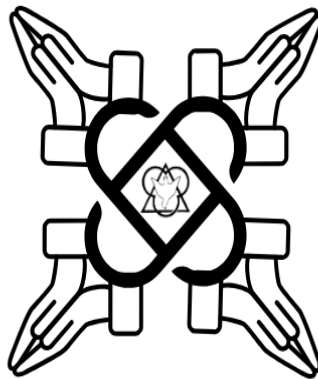

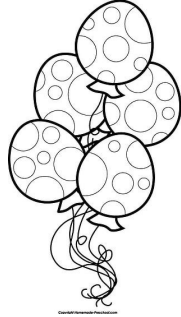

Food Pantry Continues Feeding Our Neighbors

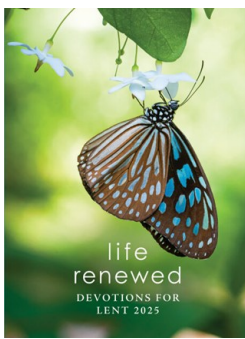
Pantry Hours: Mondays, 9-11 AM and Thursday 4-6 PM.

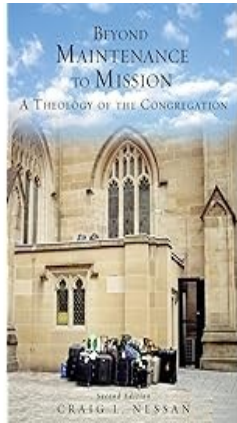


Lenten Book Study:

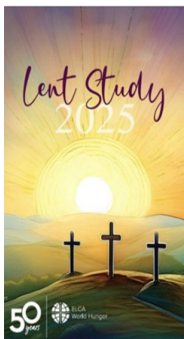

Spring Fling A Benefit for Tapestry Farms



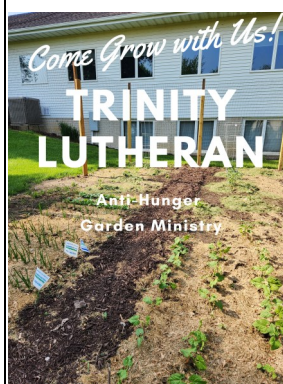
Gather in love and hope to usher in the beginning of the growing season with food, drinks, music, a silent auction, and a special guest speaker.

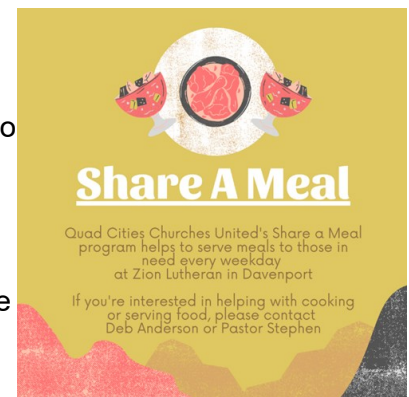

ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE MINUTES March 13, 2025

Members present: Alan Diers, Sheila Vining, Bill Romans, Pastor Stephen, Mitch Sussex (Treasurer) and Marcia Brunsvold (Council Representative).

Members absent: Susan Varilek.

Based on the balance of all funds on September 30, the 2025 distribution amount will be \$19,000.

Welcome to Bill Romans, new committee member. Reviewed that per the bylaws of the Endowment Committee, each year two members are appointed by the council and, two members are voted on by the congregation at the annual meetings.

We reviewed the Financial Report. The markets have been unstable right now so it was decided that we would not make any adjustments to the investments at this time. Mitch explained the financial to Bill. Discussion ensued.

Yearly review of Thrivent contacts – Currently Mitch and Pastor Stephen – NO changes.

Marcia had an article prepared for the April Torch. Approved by the committee with edits.

Alan, Sheila, and Mitch have indicated that they will resign from the committee/treasurer at the end of 2025. We will be looking for members of the congregation over the next few months. Mitch stated that once he prepares the spreadsheet in January for the year, he spends approximately 45 minutes per month gathering the data and preparing the financial report.

After discussion, it was decided that we did not have a need for spring distribution.

We discussed the Timeline for distribution. Applications will be accepted from May 15– to July 31. We will meet in Mid August to review the applications and in September to finalize the list of recipients that will be sent to council for approval in October. In October or November, we will meet with our representative of Thrivent to review our investments. Ideally, the incoming treasurer and members could attend this meeting.



APRIL 2025 CHURCH UPDATE

LSI serves Iowans of all ages; from families with newborns navigating parenthood, to Refugee and Immigrant elders, and children of all ages. One of the most vital populations LSI supports is young parents, especially those navigating the challenges of early motherhood. Cheyenne F., a Family Support Specialist for LSI's Healthy Families America (HOPES) program, shares the impactful work she's doing with young mothers in need of support.

She shares that she had the privilege of working closely with NF, a young mom who has shown incredible growth and resilience.

The Healthy Families America (HOPES) program is an evidence-based child abuse prevention program that provides support to prenatal families and families with children ages 0-5. LSI's Family Support Specialists work with families like NF's to provide the guidance and resources needed to break cycles of abuse and neglect and build strong, healthy foundations for children and parents alike.

NF's journey began in June 2023 when she reached out for help. At 19 years old and pregnant, NF was living in Muscatine County and knew she needed extra parenting support. Through the HOPES program, Cheyenne began building rapport with NF right away and learned about NF's challenging upbringing, which included bouncing from foster home to foster home starting at age 6.

"NF had faced so much inconsistency and pain in her early years," shared Cheyenne. **"It was clear that she had a lot of unresolved trauma, but it was equally clear that she wanted to make a positive change in her life, especially for her baby."**

Throughout the course of their work together, Cheyenne and NF focused on building trust and creating a safe space for NF to share her experiences and challenges. NF revealed that after High School, she fell into a pattern of poor choices, including run-ins with the law. NF got pregnant, and although she knew the father, he didn't want to be involved in her pregnancy or her life. Despite this, she had two strong support networks: her foster parents and her current roommate.

Cheyenne shares that NF struggled with controlling her behavior, and she feared she might end up back in jail, which unfortunately happened. When she was incarcerated, Cheyenne made sure to stay in contact with her foster parents and provided them with regular updates and support.

When NF was released from jail, she confided in Cheyenne that she was considering running away with her baby, which prompted Cheyenne to share valuable resources with her to support her mental health, housing, and employment.

"I knew that if NF ran, it could jeopardize the progress we had made. But with the right guidance and resources, NF began to see a different path forward," Cheyenne shared.

Cheyenne expressed her excitement about NF's progress stating, **"NF has made such huge strides. She started attending therapy twice a week and has also found a job at a local consignment store. She's enrolled in anger management classes and is committed to creating a better future for herself and her baby."**

Today, NF's baby is thriving, meeting all developmental milestones. NF continues to meet regularly with Cheyenne and enjoys engaging in evidence-based activities that are tailored to her needs as a young mother. **"I'm so thankful for the HOPES program. I don't know where I'd be without the support of Cheyenne,"** NF shared.

It's stories like NF's that remind us why the work we do is so important. With the right support, anything is possible.
