FREEWHEELS CELEBRATES 8 YEARS **AND 2,000 BIKES DELIVERED**

Freewheels Houston—launched at Christ the King Church in 2015—is marking its eighth anniversary and celebrating freedom through bikes for 2,000 refugees, veterans emerging from homelessness and young people from low-income families.

The Freewheels volunteer crew invites members of the congregation to join our celebration on Saturday, Nov. 18—during CTK Festival Weekend. The event will occur during the Freewheels volunteer shop day from 9 a.m. to noon at 6020 Jessamine, No. 204.


We want to thank the congregation for its unwavering support through prayers, bike donations, volunteering and financial contributions from members as well as the Christ the King Foundation.

In the first nine months of 2023, Freewheels distributed bikes that provide a way to work or school for 400 people, and we are on track to exceed record output of 452 bikes delivered during 2022. Every weekend, volunteers repair bikes and refugees and others come to get bikes as well as helmets and locks.

CTK members launched the ministry with donations of 15 used bikes. We enlisted volunteers from BikeHouston and mechanics from Rice Bikes to repair the bikes and distributed them to refugees from Syria, Iraq, Nepal, Democratic Republic of the Congo and Myanmar at a picnic at Burnett-Bayland Park in the Gulfton neighborhood during CTK Festival Weekend.

The all-volunteer organization persevered through changes in refugee policy, COVID-19 and other challenges to increase our impact and expand horizons.

Freewheels bikes enable refugees to support their families—get to a job or shop for milk and other essentials. Our bikes give veterans emerging from homelessness a way to get home from a shift that ends after the last Metro service. Working with school staff, our bikes serve as rewards for fifth- and sixth-graders in Alief ISD for superior attendance, improved grades, and progress in other areas.



8 YEARS

Freewheels has been repairing bikes and giving them to refugees and veterans for eight years. During that time, 2,000 people have received bikes.

We want people who have volunteered, donated bikes, supported us financially and held us in their prayers to help us celebrate on Saturday, Nov. 18, 10 a.m. - 11 a.m., at the shop at 6020 Jessamine #102, #103 and #204.

In 2017, at the urging of the consortium of refugee resettlement agencies, Freewheels leased shop space in Gulfton, near the apartment complexes where many refugees start new chapters of their lives in Houston.

In 2023, we have increased our capacity by building new bikes. Students from Strake Jesuit, the Breakthrough Houston student success program, corporations, and law firms have built bikes. Twenty Afghan refugees have assembled their own bikes at the Freewheels shop.

Grants from the Baxter Trust and the Scott Wizig Family Fund at Greater Houston Community Foundation enabled Freewheels to purchase bikes as well as lease additional space for bike build activities.



Freewheels welcomes everyone who wants to help is accomplished by volunteers at our Friday and Saturday shop days; knowledge of bike repair is not a requirement. Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities

The AMMPARO Committee is eager to announce a **new, ongoing giving program** that will directly support the families and individuals who seek support at St. James Family Life Center. The center actively supports the needs of a primarily immigrant community in the Garden Oaks/Oak Forest area. Their work includes providing staple food items through their food pantry, rental and utility assistance based on need and emergent situations, as well as outreach to nearby apartment complexes where they connect families with additional resources and support. They have also established relationships with HISD and Pasadena ISD to assist families in developing the skills necessary to support their children in their educational endeavors. The center also conducts citizenship classes, immigration forums, financial workshops, and ESL classes.

In order to care for the basic needs of as many people as possible on a regular basis, the AMMPARO Committee is

What other ways to connect and give are possible? We also intend to grow our relationship with St. James by offering quarterly community gatherings. We will continue to accept furniture and homewares on a selective and coordinated basis. We will provide communication about volunteer opportunities throughout the year.

We thank you for your consideration for some of the most vulnerable in our Houston community.

pledging to provide 100lbs of rice, 100lbs of beans, 40 boxes of spaghetti, and \$200/month in rental and utility support to St. James Family Life Center. **For just \$10 a month, you can provide 10lbs of beans or rice or five boxes of spaghetti to hungry families right here in Houston. For \$20 a month, you could be the reason one of our neighbors avoids eviction. For a little over \$500 a month total, we can provide food security, stable housing, and hope to new immigrants trying to make Houston their home.**

How will this work? With the congregation's generous monthly support, the AMMPARO committee will make monthly purchases to fill their food pantry and provide money for rental and utility support. Our efforts will help fulfill an ongoing need for food to fill the Center's pantry and money to support families in desperate situations.

SAINTS IN FOCUS:

DIETRICH BONHOEFFER'S FINKENWALDE SEMINARY

A Brief Lesson and the Martyrdom of Seminarians in World War II *Written by Tony Settles*

In the early 1930s in the dying days of the Weimar Republic, there arose a nationalist group, the self-styled German Christians, or *Deutsche Christen*. They were Nazis at heart who incorporated Nazi ethnicized nationalism and anti-Semitism into their theology. This means that they were both idolatrous and heretical. They pushed for a "Reich Church" that in effect replaced God with Hitler. Indeed, Bonhoeffer called Hitler "The Idol Fuehrer." Bonhoeffer's Confessing Church arose in opposition to uphold the true faith. Thus began the Church Struggle or *Kirchenkampf*. This was not only theological, it was ecclesiastical and political as well.

Bonhoeffer's reaction was:

"The next generation of pastors, these days, must be trained in church-monastic schools in which the pure Lutheran doctrine, the Sermon on the Mount, and worship are taken seriously. It is time for a complete break with what is being done by this idolatrous and dangerous state. Speak out for those who cannot speak - this is the very least the Bible asks of us in times such as these."

So Bonhoeffer's Finkenwalde Seminary was born. It lasted from April 26, 1935 until September 11, 1937 when it was shut down by the Gestapo.

But Hitler didn't stop there.

War came. All of the Western Front except Great Britain had surrendered by 1940. Then Hitler invaded the Soviet Union on June 22, 1941. This opened the war on the Eastern Front beyond Poland. The Eastern Front cataclysm

killed more people than all previous wars combined. How did that happen?

Answer: on the Eastern Front, it was not merely a war of conquests as in the West. No, Hitler waged not one, not two, but three wars of "racial genocide" against the Jews, Slavic Peoples, and the Roma. Nazi ideology classified them all as subhumans or *untermenschen* to be annihilated.

The Nazis and their Reichs Church wanted revenge against the Confessing Church, Bonhoeffer, and Finkenwalde. Orders were issued to draft Finkenwalde seminarians and send them to the racial genocidal Eastern Front rather than to the West, which had already surrendered.

OUR CALLING IN EDUCATION THIS SOCIAL STATEMENT ADOPTED BY BY THE TENTH BIENNIAL CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY OF THE ELCA (AUGUST 2007) CHICAGO, ILLINOIS.


This brief summary is an overview of the approved document (72 pages) and has been prepared by Pastor George Brookover.

The calling of Lutherans and of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in education is closely tied to a Lutheran understanding of vocation. While many understand vocation as a job or career or as the call to be a pastor or priest, Lutherans understand vocation as a calling from God that encompasses all of life for all the faithful. Martin Luther educated as an attorney and then changing “careers” upon becoming a monk studied and taught at a high level. Throughout his status as a ‘reformer’ he noted for zeroing in on the need for all God’s children to be aware of the way that one’s faith is a both a call and a responsibility for sharing the love of God for every person.

Vocation involves God’s saving call to us in baptism and life lived in joyful response to this call.

In Jesus Christ we are loved by a gracious God who frees us to love our neighbor and promote the common good;

in gratitude for God’s love, we live out our vocation in our places of responsibility in daily life—home, congregation, workplace, neighborhood, nation, and global society. Education belongs to our baptismal vocation. Our particular calling in education is two-fold: to educate people in the Christian faith for their vocation and to strive with others to ensure that all have access to high-quality education that develops personal gifts and abilities and serves the common good. This calling embraces all people in both Church and society.
