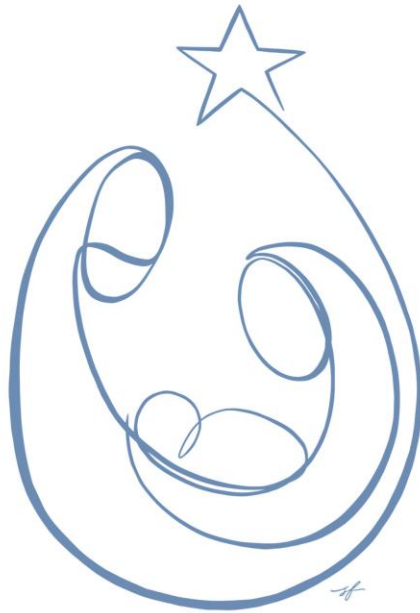

You are also welcomed to remain seated during this time.

In this leaflet, you will find most everything you need to follow along throughout the service. Whether you have been attending the Cathedral Church your whole life or this is your first time here, you are invited to participate in the service as fully as you feel comfortable doing and are able to.

Welcome/Announcements

Territorial Acknowledgement

Presider: We begin by acknowledging that we are in Mi'kma'ki , the ancestral and unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq People. This territory is covered by the “Treaties of Peace and Friendship” which Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik (Maliseet) People first signed with the British Crown in 1725. The treaties did not deal with surrender of lands and resources but in fact recognized Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik (Maliseet) title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.

Homily

A silence for reflection may follow.

Affirmation of Belief Affirming the Church's Mission -
(from the Iona Community)

Leader: That we worship one God; Creator, Redeemer, and Holy Spirit, in whose image we are made, to whose service we are summoned, by

whose presence we are renewed:

All: This we believe.

Leader: That it is central to the mission of Christ that we participate through word and action to rejoice in the diversity of human culture, to preserve the earth in all its beauty and frailty, to witness to the love of God for every person, and to invite all to share in that converting experience:

All: This we believe.

Leader: That through the power of the Holy Spirit, the persecuted shall be lifted up and the wicked will fall, the heartfelt prayers and hidden actions of God's people shall change for good the course of human history, the ancient words of scripture shall continue to startle us with fresh insight:

All: This we believe.

Leader: That God has called the Church into being to be the servant of the kingdom, to be a sign of God's new order, to celebrate in every land worship which raises our hearts to heaven:

All: This we believe.

Leader: That Christ, fully aware of our differences, prays that we may be one so that the world may believe:

**All: This we believe and to this we are committed,
for the love of God, in the way of Christ,
by the power of the Holy Spirit. Amen**

The Prayers of the People

Confession and Absolution

Leader Christmas Child –
becoming flesh, you showed what it was
to serve and share, to live and love, as God intended.

Leader As we stand at the stable door,

People **we confess that all too often our serving and sharing have
concealed or mocked your generosity, rather than making it present
and plain. *silence/kyrie***

Leader As we stand at the stable door,

People we confess that all too often our living and loving have displaced or distorted your image, rather than making it present and plain. *silence/kyrie*

Leader Christmas Child,

People as we kneel again at your manger; restore, renew and reshape us so that our serving and sharing, living and loving may, now and always, incarnate you in the world. *silence/kyrie*

Leader: For all to whom regret is real,
who seek renewal,
God forgives you,
Christ renews you
and the Holy Spirit enables you to grow in love.

People: **Amen.**

The Peace

All stand, and the presiding celebrant addresses the people.

May the peace of the Christmas Child –
the soft peace of a starlit night,
the noisy peace of a crowded stable,
the challenging peace of life and love fully lived and freely shared –
enfold, enrich and energize you.

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People **And also with you.**

The Celebration of the Eucharist

Presider: This is the feast of the Christmas Child –
a place where heaven and earth coincide,
and eternity once more condenses into time
as God is seen and known in the simple and the small,
in story and song, and in bread and wine.

So come –
whether you are drawn by joy or driven by need,

whether you walk with confident step, or stumble on faltering feet,
whether you understand the meaning, or can only wonder at the mystery
– come and gaze on the face of God
for all are welcome in the stable.

The Prayer over the Gifts

All **Good and loving God,
we rejoice in the birth of Jesus,
who came among the poor
to bring the riches of your grace.
As you have blessed us with your gifts,
let them be a blessing for others.
With the trees of the field,
with all earth and heaven,
we shout for joy at the coming of your Son,
Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.**

The Great Thanksgiving

Presider: The Lord be with you.

People: **And also with you**

Presider: Lift up your hearts

People: **We lift them up to God.**

Presider: Let us give thanks to God.

People: **It is right to give both thanks and praise.**

Presider: The story of the Christmas Child is the story of Jesus –
joyfully accepting the restriction of flesh
and entering the constraint of time
to show how life and love fully lived and freely offered
transcend their limitations:

It is the story of Jesus –
seated at a table with his friends breaking bread

the bread is broken

and pouring wine

the wine is poured

to show how life and love fully lived and freely offered
change the world.

It is the story of Jesus –
accepting a kiss and carrying a cross
to show how life and love fully lived and freely shared
count no cost.

It is the story of Jesus –
confined in a tomb but rising with the dawn
to show how life and love fully lived and freely shared
defy and defeat even death.

It is the story of Emmanuel – God, now and always
with us and for us.

So, as we take this bread and wine –
in remembrance of that life and love – we give thanks
for the healing and hope which spring
from the coming, living, dying and rising of the Christmas Child.

And,
with those who gather round his crib,
with the angel choirs,
and the singing planets,
we join in creation's song of joy ...

**All: Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of Love and Light,
heaven and earth are full of your Light
Glory to You, our God.
Blessed is He, blessed are we,
blessed are all who come
to your Light.
Glory to You, our God.**

And as we follow the example of Jesus
send down your Holy Spirit on us,
and on these gifts of bread and wine,
that the story of the Christmas Child –
of life fully lived and freely shared –
may continue on
in us and through us,
until the world is transformed.

People **Amen.**

Presider And now, as our Saviour Christ has taught us,
we are bold to say,

All **Our Father, who art in heaven,
hallowed be thy name,
thy kingdom come,
thy will be done,
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those who trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom,
the power, and the glory,
for ever and ever. Amen.**

The Breaking of the Bread

The presider breaks the consecrated bread for distribution

Presider: Emmanuel who came to us in the Christmas Child, and who comes to us still through the living, loving and sharing of others, offers these signs of his Presence and invites us to join our story with theirs.

The presider invites the people to share in communion and may say,

Presider The gifts of God for the People of God.

All **Thanks be to God.**

The Communion



We invite you to come forward to receive the bread and wine. Please take a cup from the table to receive the wine of the Eucharist, you may leave the cup in the tray as you return to your seat. You are also welcome to come forward for a prayer of blessing should you choose not to receive. We are happy to come to you at your seat should you desire.

Prayer after Communion

Presider: The starlight and song, story and supper,
which called us home now compel us to go out.

***All:* May we who have knelt at the manger always have room
to hold within ourselves the Christmas Child.
May we who have gazed on the face of God
learn to live fully, and to share freely all that we have and are.
So may Emmanuel – God with us and for us –
be once again incarnated in the world.**

The Blessing:

Presider: Now go in peace,
do what God wills, follow where Christ calls,
pray for the gifts of the Spirit;
and the blessing of God the Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer
rest on, and remain with you, now and always. **Amen.**
