Matthew 9

Jesus stepped into a boat, crossed over and came to his own town. 2 Some men brought to him a paralyzed man, lying on a mat. Matthew 9:1,2

While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and sinners came and ate with him and his disciples. Verse 10

Then John's disciples came and asked him, "How is it that we and the Pharisees fast often, but your disciples do not fast?" Verse 14

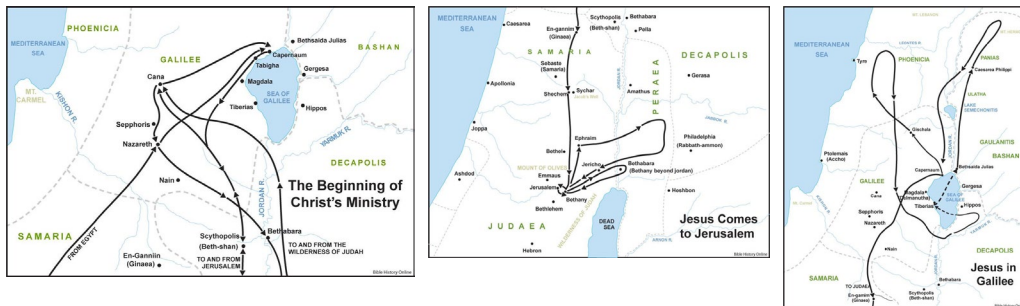
While he was saying this, a synagogue leader came and knelt before him and said, "My daughter has just died." Verse 18

As Jesus went on from there, two blind men followed him, calling out, "Have mercy on us, Son of David!" Verse 27

While they were going out, a man who was demon-possessed and could not talk was brought to Jesus. And when the demon was driven out, the man who had been mute spoke. Verse 32,33

Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. Verse 35

When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Verse 36
