Author: Date: Writing Style:	Prophet Joel Around the reign of King Hezekiah (715–686 BC) A collection of sermons
Characteristics:	Joel is very poetic. The next part of the book refers back to the past and so on. Written much like a story
One-liner:	'Because of our sin, it's going to get worse before it gets better. But it will get better one day.'
Key verses:	2:12–13 - The "imminent" day of the Lord refers to the future invasion of Judah by the Assyrians, when the land is devastated and Jerusalem surrounded by armies.
Background:	Joel was written because a plague of locusts was consuming the nation of Judah. But the plague is meant to show attention on something that endures forever - an eternal God and His future Kingdom.
