CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT -

he Church Council consists of these at large members: Roger Bloomquist (term ends Feb 2026); Karen Erickson (term ends Feb 2024); Gary Floss (term ends Feb 2024); Zachary Johnson (term ends Feb 2026); Konah Naimah (term ends Feb 2025); John Vanderwerf (term ends Feb 2026); and Don Zatroch (term ends Feb 2025).

The Executive Committee meets monthly in addition to Church council meetings, and consists of the officers and the lead pastor:



Diane Shallue, President; Jill Loegering, President-elect; Tracy Harstad, Treasurer; Paul Wilde L'Heureux, Secretary; and Pastor Sonja Hagander. Officers serve one-year terms and can be elected for a second term. Pastor Sonja Hagander and Pastor Sarah Anderson both have voice and vote at Church Council meetings. Pastor Ana Becera is a frequent non-voting visitor.

In 2023 the church council was very busy with various financial matters. We worked to increase income and control spending with committees/teams and the staff. The Council worked with Pastor Sonja on updating procedures and policies to give the congregation a solid foundation to move forward.

In 2023, the church council discussed and approved these items:

- Revisions to the Personnel Manual.
- A contract with Kingwood Security Consulting to do a risk/security assessment of the CtK property.
- Replacement of Sanctuary lights and lights in the lower level with LED's.
- A contract with Essence Real Estate Services to find tenants to lease space in our building this has led to a lease agreement with Home Planning Associates to use space in our building for their business.
- Switching to Breeze, a new data base for our membership and tracking of donations.
- A new CtK Guest Wireless Access Acceptable Use Policy.
- A revised Financial Policy with a new cash management policy section.
- Hiring an in-house accountant and phasing out our contract with CLA for financial reports and paying of bills.
- A letter of call as lead pastor to Sonja Hagander and a special congregational meeting to approve this call.

In addition, the Church Council hosted a meeting of all leaders of committees/teams on November 28 to create budgets for each committee/team and discuss financial status of the congregation. We hosted a Ministry Fair in October for groups to highlight their ministries at CtK and helped establish a CtK-Cristo Rey Coordination Team that will meet quarterly. Don Zatroch will be the Church Council liaison to this new team.

We have worked to share church council minutes and financial reports with the congregation in a timely manner.

We thank the congregational members for their trust, financial support for our ministries at CtK, and for their encouragement and respectful dialogue. Church members are always welcome to attend Church Council meetings.

Lead Pastor's Report

y annual report is an opportunity to remember and give thanks. Giving thanks is integral to following Jesus. As a church, we participate often in giving thanks. Our meal together at Holy Communion is an invitation into Jesus' thanksgiving. In the Gospel of Luke, we read, "And

Jesus took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them." "He gave thanks" in Greek is "Eucharisteo," - a word of grace. The presider at the table often raises her hands in thanksgiving. - I remember the ministry of the Call Committee and their endurance and faithfulness and give thanks to each of them: Nathan Lemke, Cyndi Lesher, Zoe Miller, Gordie Olson, Caleb Ward, Jennifer Wilprecht Walczak. I give thanks to CtK and am joy-filled for being called by you to serve as one of your pastors! My installation is Sunday, February 25th during worship with brunch to follow.
- I remember the planning of the Welcome the Pastor Task Force (Meredith Bearden, Priscilla Berg, Mark Edwards, Liz Michog, Paulette Olsen, Karen Peterson) and look forward to the cottage meetings where we will not only get to know each other further, but dream together about mission and vision and how God is pulling us into the future to love God and neighbor. I am thrilled to enter into this next season with you.
- I remember the multitude of gifts and talents and time shared over the course of this last year in many areas of ministry and leadership. My hands are raised in thanksgiving!

Associate Pastor's Report

n this Time after Epiphany, we continue to look for and experience the many ways God is revealed in our midst. Throughout the last year I have witnessed many times among you where God's presence is moving and stirring. As the magi were guided by the light of the star, may we continue to be guided by the light of Christ.

A fundamental privilege of being a pastor is the chance to walk with families at different stages of life from birth to death. This year we welcomed new co-workers with us in the kingdom of God through the sacrament of baptism and as we did, we also said good-bye to many saints in the faith, walking with grieving families during memorial and funeral services. These holy events and all those in-between give witness to God's faithfulness to each of us.

At the church council's retreat in February, several foundational items across ministry areas were identified. One of those foundational items is congregational care, and I, along with two church council members, Karen Erickson and Gary Floss, spent several months taking a closer look. Together we visited four area faith



communities to listen and learn about their model and programs of congregational care. We learned that CtK has similar programs as those we talked to, but all of them have one thing CtK does not... a care team. In the fall, a congregational forum was held to hear about our findings as well as our proposal that a care team be formed at CtK. One goal of 2024 is to initiate a care team which will begin to coordinate and communicate the caring ministries which currently exist. Some existing caring ministries include the prayer chain, prayer shawl, faith community nurses and Lay Shepherds (a visiting ministry).

Toward the end of 2023, many people applied for Thrivent Action Team money to offset some of the expenses related to Wednesday evening meals, and Sunday donuts and coffee. I would like to see the use of Thrivent Action teams increase in 2024 as a way to support the ministry of CtK. risto Rey is the only Spanish speaking mission /church in the Saint Paul Area Synod for which we

are blessed to serve siblings within the Twin Cities and as far as Burnsville all the way to Elk River. Our blessings include helping newcomers to find jobs, to enroll in school, find transportation, and navigate the health system.

During 2023 Cristo Rey provided interpreters and fully funded 27 families to receive furniture and household items through Bridging. This ministry was able to connect with several families and help to direct them to other resources.



Cristo Rey members' attendance is more consistent and responded very well to activities outside of the building. I am very glad to see that we are doing our best to interconnect with people from other backgrounds.

I pray that our relationship with Christ the King continues to grow and to see each other's gifts as a blessing to all.

Director of Worship and Music's Report

orship and music at Christ the King / Cristo Rey continues to be a vibrant experience that is essential to the faith of those gathered by God on Sunday mornings both in-person and online. In 2023, we saw consistent worship attendance throughout the year which reflects the steadfastness of folks who find our worship life meaningful, challenging, comforting, and encouraging. Averages for weekly attendance include in-person: 148, YouTube: 99, and Facebook: 9, with an overall average of 251 worshippers per week in 2023. These numbers do not include Cristo Rey, funerals or seasonal mid-week worship services.



As of late, it's been exciting to notice new faces and families in the pews who are looking for a church home and immediately find CtK to be a place of warmth and welcome. This isn't just a result of the quality worship music and preaching (though those certainly help) but is a result of committed CtK folks who go out of their way to seek a new face and introduce themselves.

It's also been exciting to hear from our music ensembles on a regular basis during the school year. Our singers, ringers, and instrumentalists are frequently heard on Sunday mornings, adding artistic depth to an already rich worship experience. Thank you to all our musicians who show up practically every week to share their gifts to glorify God. We owe a very special thank you to Ron Olsen, who freely gives of his time to direct Glory Sound and Christ's Kingsmen and to accompany the choir from the piano. Thank you, Ron – you are truly a gift to this place!





We also have an incredible core group of volunteers who are always eager to find new folks to help serve as ushers, worship coordinators, greeters, brew crew, on the altar team, and at the welcome desk. Thank you to you who volunteer -- for showing up and taking good care to make certain CtK is ready to welcome everyone who walks through the door. Special shout out to Don Zatroch who volunteers his time almost every week to run the livestream camera for online worship.

2024 will be a year of deepening congregational involvement in our worship life through the establishment of a new Worship Task Force. This group will

be led by Jen Miller and we will work together to establish points of meaningful intersection and collaboration with committees and teams throughout the church. Certainly, on the top of our to-do list will be to prepare the entire congregation for a major renovation



needed to keep our organ sounding beautiful. Keep an eye out for ways you can connect with the Worship Task Force soon.

Highlights from 2023:

- Guest worship leaders, The Many, held up residency at CtK and led worship in October with the generous support from the CtK Music & Arts Series fund.
- In partnership with the CtK Property Committee and with the generous support from the congregation, the lights in the Sanctuary were updated to LED fixtures in April.
- In the summer, the entire CtK music wing was cleaned up and reorganized to make room for outside rental space.



- Community choir, Kantorei, continues to hold up rehearsal residency at CtK with members from the choir being featured in worship on select Sundays throughout the year.
- Meaningful and ongoing collaboration with the Racial Justice Team, Global Mission Team, Local Mission Partners, and Care for Creation continue to deepen our worship life.

Looking forward to 2024:



- Formation of the Worship Task Force, led by Jen Miller.
- Preparation for organ repair work tentatively set for summer of 2025.
- Director of Worship, Nate Crary, upcoming sabbatical from June to July of 2024.
- Continued improvement and updating of Sanctuary A/V software and equipment to improve both the in-person and online worship experience.
- Continued partnership with CtK Property committee to improve ease of accessibility in the Sanctuary.

We also made it back to the Appalachian Mountains again for a service trip. There were 5 of us and it was so good to be back. Hoping to bring at least one crew back this summer (maybe 2).

• Children's Christmas Pageant – The pageant was a wonderful opportunity for kids to come

- together and tell the story of Jesus' birth. This year we brought in the Superheroes. Our kids are so talented!! They worked so hard and were amazing.
- We had our 2nd annual Gingerbread house challenge. It is so fun to see families coming together to create. Some come with plans. Some just wing it.
- Monthly intergenerational event We started having intergenerational events to try to start bringing generations together. It has mostly been young families

that have attended but we'll keep at it and hopefully it will catch on[©]. We did one of the SALT on "giving". We had a service opportunity on care packages for those in the Armed Forces, Gingerbread Challenge. Keep a look out for more to come.

- This past year I was able to put together a Children's Ministry team and we have been meeting monthly. This has been a huge help and a wonderful partnership.
- Other Children's outings (outdoor) –Easter Egg hunt, Gingerbread Challenge, Baptism Sunday, Blogs, Vlogs, S.A.L.T., Extravaganza (a children and youth conference through the ELCA -all on-line this year), and attending many games, plays, concerts and dances.

- Oversaw the role of the Clifton Larson Allen (CLA) (accounting service for non-profits) in analyzing the financials for Christ the King for needed adjustments to our financial information, in addition to improving the financial system and processes.
- Oversaw the transition of reducing CLA role to oversight and hiring a part-time accountant who started in January 2024, this will reduce overall expense.
- Reviewed monthly and annual financial statements and recommended approval by the Congregational Council.
- Supported the planning of budget processes for 2023 and 2024.
- Supported efforts to improve financial results, including investment of cash reserves in higher yielding certificates of deposits and savings account.

the process and all their work is greatly appreciated. Currently about 50% of our yearly electricity needs are produced by our solar panels. This last May we replaced all the Sanctuary incandescent lights with LED lights. That

- This last May we replaced all the Sanctuary incandescent lights with LED lights. That improvement has reduced our power consumption of Sanctuary lights by 90%. The actual lumens (measured light output) has increased while the power consumption has gone down.
- A new emergency exit door and hardware was installed in the lower level to replace the old door which would not open property. The old door had rendered the emergency exit as "Not Code Compliant." The new door is Code Compliant.
- Some funds remained from the Sanctuary LED lighting project so that money was augmented so additional lower level lights could be converted to LED. This project will continue to also money on lighting going forward.
- This summer the city of New Brighton marked our 8 Ash trees on our property for removal. Because this directive had to be acted upon within 30-days, Property took quick action to have the trees removed. By getting multiple bids we were able to save several thousand dollars.

Through the early spring we started various native species of prairie flowers from seed, gathered some plants by donation, and used funding from the CtK Foundation grant to purchase additional

Global Mission Team

he Christ the King Global Mission Team has been formally in existence since the mid 1980s. We

participate in the Companion Congregation program (BegaKwaBega) through the St. Paul Area Synod and the Iringa Diocese, with the Nduli Parish as our partner. In the northern Tanzania Arusha area, we work through Operation Bootstrap Africa to support students from the MaaSAE Girls Lutheran

In 2023, CtK members generously donated \$4,842 for Global Mission Sunday and \$6,095 for Alternative Christmas Gifts.

Secondary School (MGLSS), Moringe Sokoine Secondary School (MSSS), School of Nursing (SON), Madagascar Schools, and many special needs schools/projects. Support may come in the form of scholarships, school lunches and supplies, buildings, teacher's salaries, a well, etc.

Throughout these 24 years, members of Christ the King have supported the Global Mission Team ministries through Global Mission Sunday donations for scholarships and Alternative Christmas gift purchases. In 2023, CtK members generously donated \$4,842 for Global Mission Sunday and \$6,095 for Alternative Christmas Gifts. This past year, we wrote for and received two grants from the Christ the King Foundation. The first grant for \$5,000 went to the MGLSS for a scholarship for one student in honor of Dr. Seth Msinjili (Retired Director). The second grant for \$7,000 went to Madagascar Schools for hiring of an additional teacher at each of the five schools. Prior to this grant the teacher at each of the five Malagasy schools often worked with several hundred students and therefore hiring an additional teacher reduced the ratio of students in half.

Gifts from CtK members provide for a range of activities for people in Tanzania, Madagascar, and Uganda. They primarily include: scholarships for students, agricultural products and animals, medical supplies and training, and construction and maintenance of churches and schools. The Global Mission Team deeply appreciates your generous support in all these areas - making a big difference and creating wonderful opportunities for the lives of our African friends.



Since many of our Global Mission Team members retired this past year, it is our hope that there will be renewed interest by CtK members in joining our team so that we can continue our global mission work. In the process, our team developed a hybrid plan for downsizing the team's work and made the difficult decision to make this the last year to sell Alternative Christmas Gifts. We are grateful for your support of that activity for the past 18 years.

Local Mission Partners Team

fter missing our traditional November LMP Sunday, we had two of them in 2023: February and November. Pastor Thomas Tsen of Minnesota Faith Chinese LC was guest pastor in February, and Pastor Jen Collins of Redeemer LC in November. Both congregations face the type of challenges that led them to become mission partners with CtK: changing circumstances; lingering financial issues from the COVID pandemic; and for Faith Chinese, international tensions. We committed to backstop egg roll sales at Faith in case they did not sell out and we have not had to.

Our mission is to be friends with our partners, an emergency resource for small financial needs... and to become closer to other groups and services at Christ the King. Member Vern Rice was presented the top award from partner Daily Work for his strong personal and organizational backing of their mission to get jobs, then better ones through training, for their clients. Daily Work is spending lots of time bringing Afghan refugees into the culture and businesses of their new home this year.

We had Pastor William Siong of Eternal Flame Hmong LC at our May meeting; they have retained an associate pastor, Jua Jay Her as of April. Pastor William noted there are several clans in the Hmong community, and they are slow to pledge. In the second half of the year, Pastor started a YouTube channel, and has garnered as high as 30,000 unique views of his sermons, including as far away as Vietnam.

LMP served a pizza dinner to Cristo Rey in June burning through two dozen pizzas, as well as watermelon and all the fixings. There was little left for take-



home for members who wanted more, but we cleared the table. We maintain ties with Cristo Rey, with several visits from Pastor Ana.

As I write this a half-dozen LMP members are preparing to go to Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, for a week of assisting our partners with Families of Hope in a day center with neighborhood kids. LMP pioneered paying for 10 of the children to go to school, straight through high school, to escape the dump neighborhood served by Families of Hope.

One of the initial LMP partners at foundation, Redeemer LC in Minneapolis, is seeing the neighborhood facing gentrification. The history of the Harrison neighborhood has been one of a life start for new and disadvantaged families. This is a true local church of community service, from daycare, to training seminarians in serving the inner city, to providing a block party and Christmas Store.



Our mission is to be friends with our partners, an emergency resource for small financial needs as funds allow, and to become closer to other groups and services at Christ the King. We started the year providing the donuts for fellowship after church, in hopes of pulling more groups to that service. We participated in the October Mission Fair, and were surprised to see the breadth of service among lay groups.

Racial Justice Team

We continue to live into our mission of combating systemic racism in our congregation and community through the strategies of learning, relationships and advocacy. In doing so we dream of becoming the beloved community with increased racial understanding, deeper relationships and effective actions towards racial justice. This is how we enacted our mission and values in 2023:



- Became the Racial Justice Team (claiming our commitment to long-term work and advocacy).
- Sponsored SALT presentation on Martin Luther King, Jr on January 15, 2023 and did the Children's Message in worship that Sunday.
- During Black History Month, presented a Wednesday evening forum on Racial Covenants in the Twin Cities metro, showing a clip from "Jim Crow of the North Stories." Participants had the opportunity to discover if their homes had a history of a racial covenant on their mortgage.
- Presented a four-part SALT series on "White Church Truths" organized by Don Zatroch.
- Participated in a Table Event at the New Brighton Summer Concert Series on June 8, 2023.

- Encouraged congregational participation in various learning opportunities including zoom learning through the ELCA Truth and Healing Movement and a city of New Brighton offering on Racial Covenants through Just Deeds.
- Held a half day retreat for team members and interested individuals, reviewing where we have been and where we hope to go in the future.
- Publicized and highlighted National Day of Remembrance for Indian Boarding Schools.
- Participated in Christ the King's Ministry Fair.
- Sponsored a field trip to Bethel University to see the documentary "Border of Dreams", focusing on stories from southern border crossings. This was a joint documentary by students from Bethel and a university from Guatemala.
- Offered an October 4 week book discussion on the book "US-the Resurrection of American Terror" by the Rev. Kenneth Wheeler. About 14 people purchased books while between 8 and 10 participated in the weekly book discussion.
- Sponsored a SALT forum by Rebecca Thompson on Diversity and Children's Literature. From that event, came "Becca's Top Ten Books" for people to use as a guide for buying diversity books for children/grandchildren
- Coordinated a field trip to the Minneapolis Institute of Art to see the photography exhibit "In Our Hands: Native Photography, 1890-Now" on January 9, 2024.

Some of our goals for 2024 include developing a Land Acknowledgement for Christ the King, sponsoring a spring field trip to one of the many historical sites here in MN with racial and indigenous significance, holding a forum to explore how to respond when one hears racist remarks and how to sift through racial/discriminatory rhetoric to understand what is really being said, working to strengthen relationships and partnerships in and around New Brighton and the surrounding communities, and being

Much of the work being done in 2023 and 2024 centers on

modernization and addressing past delinquency in maintaining the technical environment at CtK.

Main projects completed in 2023 include:

- Creation of 2024 technical budget.
- Team assessment of current equipment.
- Sound loft cleanup and equipment removal.
- Creation of two Audio Visual carts.
- Creation of guest internet use policy document.
- Transition to Breeze ChMS.

Primary tech projects in 2024 include:

- Recruiting 1-2 additional members to the Tech Team.
- Cataloging an inventory of all CtK technology hardware, software and technical services.
- Adoption of CtK Technical User Guide.
- Adoption of CtK Technology Policy.
- Mapping the CtK network.
- Purchase of upgraded sanctuary camera and improving livestream capabilities.
- Implementing funding and purchase plans for upgraded sanctuary projector.
- Eliminating redundant or otherwise unnecessary technology.

Decisions/recommendations of the CtK Tech Team are referred to the church council/executive committee for approval and adoption.

- Grants totaling **\$88,400** were awarded under the categories of Church, Community and Global for the year. See attached for details and the good work the grants support.
- One grant to highlight, the \$7,000 for sanctuary LED lights matched by the congregation, made a huge difference in the brightening up of our worship.
- Grant application deadlines were announced for April 1 and October 1.
- The Publicity group supported one of the Pizza Nights to connect with members of CTK. The group helped with setup and clean-up; prepared and baked pizzas in the pizza oven (in sweltering heat!), provided vegetables, fruit and



dessert to complete the menu. Retired members of the Foundation were also recruited to help with the event and we had a great turn-out. Successful evening enjoyed by all!

• The Foundation provided financial support for the Ministry Fair on October 1. Many people visited the informational tables set up by various committees and also the Boy Scouts. It was festive with a fall theme and lunch which included egg rolls, sandwiches, fruit and vegetables, chips, and cookies and brownies. CTK had not had a ministry fair in several years so it was deemed informational and successful and suggested that it returns to being an annual affair.

Focusing on 2024:

- With strong contributions (THANK YOU) and good investment performance, the Foundation
 will be able to grant up to \$104,000 in 2024, the highest amount in its history. Contributions
 received included appreciated stock, qualified charitable distributions (QCD) from IRAs,
 donor advised funds, Thrivent dollars and bequests through wills. Many ways to give, some
 tax advantaged.
- The Publicity Committee plans to work with Nick on updating the website for more visibility and pizzaz; and look for our new display board in the narthex near the Welcoming Desk!
- We plan to keep you informed about Foundation activities and updates as they will appear in the Herald and Sunday blogs as well as on the screen on Sunday mornings.
- We will celebrate the 35th anniversary of the Foundation, which is in February, throughout the year, by acknowledging the founders and those who have followed in their footsteps in addition to highlighting a variety of successful grant awards.
