Church mission statement: Serving Christ and Neighbor in the Heart of Winchester & Beyond

Guiding Vision:

As called by Christ to move beyond our comfort zones and take our spiritual gifts out into the world, and as a PC(USA) Matthew 25 congregation, we recognize the faith journey of each of us is enriched by our ministry and service to others in need in Winchester and beyond. Further, as a PC(USA) Creation Care congregation we affirm that our mission extends to the healing of all of God's creation.

Guiding Principles:

- Continually seek God's direction for supporting FPC's mission involvement both near and far.
- Recognize that effective ministry goes beyond providing funding to include giving time, talents, and resources.
- Strive to employ good mission practices; i.e., practices that are collaborative and nontransactional, and where we can build relationships with partners.
- Nurture the faith journeys of our congregation by offering opportunities for mission outreach and growing disciples that include intergenerational activities for children and youth..
 - Make special efforts to develop inter-generational mission activities, including children and youth.
- Give special emphasis to opportunities for mission in the greater Winchester area.
- Recognize that ministry of presence is a legitimate mission outreach.
- Promote and share with the congregation our ministry as a Matthew 25 Congregation that advocates to reduce human suffering. This means a focus on the following three points:
 - building congregational vitality,
 - dismantling structural racism, and
 - eradicating systemic poverty.
- As an Earth Care Congregation, we promote and support good environmental stewardship, this includes reducing our carbon footprint.
- Support local peacemaking initiatives and promote the PC(USA) Peace & Global Witness annual special offering.
- Review these Guiding Principles at least annually and evaluate our suite of outreach projects at the beginning of each budget cycle.

FPC originally supported CCAP who distributed supplies every fall. Now, the distribution is handled through Bright Futures warehouse since 2015. City schools were added in 2017.

We focus on student needs to aid in creating an environment that makes learning more accessible. These needs include clothing shoes, school supplies, food access.

OBJECTIVE

- Food access: Weekend Food Pack Program- weekly during school year.
- Summer Food- supplemental food boxes to support nutritional needs.
- School Readiness: school supplies backpacks, crayons
- Basic Needs Packet; shampoo, soap etc.
- Holiday Assistance Sponsors to support students with holiday gifts.
- Christmas Angel Tree sponsor a family to meet Christmas Gift needs (clothing).



CCAP is a 501(c)(3) non profit, charitable organization that is funded by area faith communities, businesses, civic groups, bequests and most of all many private giving individuals.

CCAP is a community lifeline for all people in our area who find themselves struggling to meet basic needs, providing stability and security while enabling them find paths to selfsufficiency. CCAP was formed in October of 1974 by eleven local churches as the Christian Cooperative Action Program. We then changed our name to Congregational Community Action Project in 1975 to broaden our reach to encompass more need.

The mission of the Faith Stories Project and Colectivo Teatral Historias de Fe (Faith Stories Theatre Collective) is to empower women in Guatemala and the U.S. by artistically exploring the complexities of how faith affects their lives. It provides a space where women can share their stories and participate in the creation of a collaboratively devised work based on those stories. It allows for mutual support and encouragement, building self-esteem, and creating a sense of community for women of faith in both countries as we struggle to tear down barriers and explore how we are more alike than different.

OBJECTIVE

1. Determine progress, and challenges to the growth of the program.

2. Provide training support for community theater performance-for the Theater Company regarding domestic violence.

3. Support a "Ministry of Presence" for the women in Guatemala.

- 7 different communities participate in the theater company activities.
- 6 women have had their phone plans sponsored for the year 2023.

HF monies go directly to third party providers. The HF is now part of the mission outreach legacy of FPC and has been meeting the emergency needs of many in our community.

OBJECTIVE

- housing

- rent
- utilities
- unexpected car repairs

- Clients are tracked and allowed to seek assistance once per year for three years before reaching their limit of assistance.
- Mission council funds stipend at 330/month

Provide food and other assistance to those in need and engage our community in the fight to end hunger.

Operational since 1980s Currently a Non-for profit with a Board.

Primary Coordination- FPC.

A member agency of the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank network, Highland Food Pantry of Winchester, Virginia serves people in the northern Shenandoah Valley experiencing chronic hunger. Our main activity is the distribution of food to individuals and families in need. We are a United Way partner. Highland Food Pantry envisions ending hunger in the northern Shenandoah Valley.

OBJECTIVE

Provide:

- Food to individuals and families that are food insecure every Tuesday morning and evening weekly.
- Special deliveries of food to senior adults who are not able to come to the pantry.
- Special deliveries of food by partnering with Family Promise to delivery to families with children that are currently living in motels.
- Court Ordered Community Service Opportunities.
- Integration of Youth and Seniors as volunteer help.
- Food for patients of the Winchester Comprehensive Treatment Center (methadone treatment center) on a monthly basis.
- Emergency aid for families who have hit a crisis point.

- **IMPACT**
- # of families/individuals in the program = 26,318 (2023) # of households participating = 8,683 (2023)
 - # of delivered food boxes to seniors in need = 203 (each month)
 - # of delivered food boxes to families through Family Promise = 17 (each month)
 - #CTC treatment center boxes = 10 (each month)
 - Fundraising: Men on a Mission FPC collecting egg cartons

Lunch is typically a sit down meal starting at 11 am in the Fellowship Hall off of the Loudoun street walking mall.

OBJECTIVE

Serve meals for guests every Saturday over a period of 52 weeks of the year.

Apple Blossom Saturday and the Saturday following Thanksgiving are the two holidays the kitchen is closed.

Supporting new refugee settlement.

First Presbyterian's Refugee Resettlement team works with Church World Service in Winchester. Although the overall volunteer team is ecumenical and includes many members of the community, FPC volunteers have been faithfully engaged in this work.

Operational since 2016:

• Initiated by Grace Lutheran and expanded to FPC and other churches.

OBJECTIVE

To Provide:

- Coordination of housing in partnership with CWS.
- Provide transportation for moving furniture and individual refugee needs (Dr. appointments, food).
- FPC provides Basic Pantry supplies, Welcome Meal for new homes, and assists with transportation (furniture moving and individual needs).
- CWS provides housing, cultural orientations, transportation and English language services.

IMPACT

• 125 individuals to date; 400 individuals currently living in Winchester (clarification needed)

USDA certified and affiliated with the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank. SFP provides clients with food purchased by or donated to the Pantry. Currently serving clients from Frederick, Shenandoah, and Clarke County in Virginia, and neighboring counties in West Virginia.

OBJECTIVE

Provide food to families that are food insecure.

- Two evenings /month 1st and 3rd Thursday.
 - Families are able to choose their preferences.

IMPACT

Participating:

• 20-25 families per week and 70-84 families per month

ABOUT

To break the cycle of homelessness one life at a time, we empower individuals to re-enter the workforce and connect individuals to the resources needed to be as self-sufficient as possible while providing a safe, temporary shelter during extreme weather.

Operational since 2008.

WATTS (501-C3) provides case workers and services as needed.

WATTS is a low-barrier shelter, meaning they will take ANYONE who is homeless, regardless of sobriety or criminal background; they seek to eliminate the "barriers" that prevent guests from entering other shelters and simply get them off the streets. For this reason, the shelter is for ADULTS ONLY and all volunteers must be at least 18 YEARS OF AGE.

OBJECTIVE

To Provide:

- Day-night shelter, safety and security for the homeless for 21 weeks between November and March- the coldest months of the year.
- Meals (breakfast, dinner, and snacks).
- Showers and Hygiene products.
- Basic Medical Care (BP, first Aid, referrals).
- Social Activities and Enrichment (bingo, television, etc).

- Winter months: 35 guests (adults) for 7 days over 21 weeks at various locations.
- Summer months: Cooling Shelter for a few weeks. 12 5pm Mon-Sat. *Sundays 1pm-5pm. Summer site varies.

ADDITIONAL FPC SUPPORTED MISSIONS



Fremont Street Nursery opened its door in 1943 to care for the children of mothers who had gone to work to support their families during World War II. It is the oldest licensed child care center in the City of Winchester. Providing more than 70 years of child care services. Fremont continues the tradition of providing quality care for children so their parents can work without worry or concern.
