Welcome to Emmanuel Episcopal Church. We are glad you joined us today!

Whoever you are and wherever you find yourself on the journey of faith, there is a place for you here. We welcome everyone to join and participate fully in worship. The bulletin should contain all you need to participate in worship. Text the congregation reads aloud is **printed in bold**. This symbol $\mathbf{\Phi}$ denotes the appropriate time to make the sign of the cross upon yourself, if it is your custom.

Mask-wearing is optional. The rear pews are designated for socially-distanced seating for those who wish. Please sanitize your hands as you enter and immediately before Communion.

THE SEASON OF EPIPHANY

The feast of the Epiphany falls on the 6^{th} of January each year, following the 12 days of Christmas. This festival appears to have developed in the early part of the 4^{th} century and its name comes from a Greek word meaning "appearance" or "manifestation" since Epiphany is associated with the manifestation of Christ to the world.

The season following the Epiphany is of variable length because it continues until the beginning of Lent. The first Sunday after the Epiphany is special because it commemorates the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River. The last Sunday after the Epiphany (the Sunday before Lent begins on Ash Wednesday) is also special as we celebrate the Transfiguration.

The Gospel appointed on Epiphany (which is rarely a Sunday, so we don't often hear it) is the well-known story of the magi following a star to worship the newborn Jesus in Bethlehem. So we will keep our decorative glass stars over the choir pews and organ to remind us where we are in the calendar. We will also be using Eucharistic Prayer C, with its references to space, galaxies, and planets.

About Today's Service

February 2nd marks a feast on the church calendar that we don't often get to observe on a Sunday: The Presentation of our Lord. This is an ancient Christian celebration, documented at least as far back as the late fourth century in Jerusalem. Set 40 days after the birth of Jesus at Christmas, it recalls Mary and Joseph bringing Jesus to the Temple to perform the ritual sacrifice required of Jewish mothers after childbirth.

The Candlemas rite probably developed several centuries later in Rome and included a procession of candles and the singing of the Nunc dimittis, which were the words spoken by Simeon in the Temple that we will hear in today's Gospel reading. It became the custom of the church to bless all of the candles to be used during the year on that day -- something we will do today. In addition, you are invited to present your own candles from home to be blessed, in recognition of Jesus being the light of the world.

Prelude

The congregation gathers in the back of the church The Celebrant greets the people with these words

Dear people of God, forty days ago we celebrated the joyful feast of the Incarnation of Jesus. Today we recall the day on which he was presented in the temple, fulfilling the law of Moses. Led by the Spirit, Simeon and Anna came to the temple, recognized the child as the Christ, and proclaimed him with joy. United by the same Spirit, we now enter the house of God, where we shall recognize Christ in the breaking of bread.

Let us pray.

O eternal God, who has created all things; on this day you fulfilled the petitions of the just Simeon: We humbly ask you to bless and sanctify these candles for our use. Graciously hear our prayers and be merciful to us, whom you have redeemed by your Son, who is the light of the world, and who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The following canticle is then said, during which the candles are lit

For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

✗The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, [Mary and Joseph] brought [Jesus] up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons." Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel." And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too." There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.

If you do not wish to receive, you are invited to cross your arms over your chest to indicate that you would like a blessing, which will be delivered without touch.

Elizabeth Anne Rimkus (Class of 1995) Memorial Grant for the Arts

Since 1996, the grant has been awarded to 31 recipients. The purpose is to help defray costs in the early year of their college/university pursuits in the arts. In "Thank you!" letters and emails from many of the recipients, have successfully gone on in their varying fields of art. Sad to say, the grant has been poorly funded and now requires "the family" to provide the monies each year. The hope is that generous people will help to establish a fund here at Emmanuel much like that of the David E. Weaver IV Fund and disburse it when I am gone.

Elizabeth was on the first Nazareth Soccer team and became a true soccer player who gave the game her best efforts and encouraged other on her team. As a result, the Soccer coaches in 1995 put together an award in her memory known as the "Heart-of-the-Team" award to the graduating player who showed the same determination, "spunk',



and loyalty to the team as Elizabeth did. In 1996 I was made aware of this award and have provided each year since, a plaque and a monies to the recipient to help with their equipment needs in the sport... or whatever. -Deacon Bill Rimkus, 2025

Early on, Art became an important aspect in Elizabeth's life and at Nazareth, under the guidance of Mrs. Garside she blossomed. At fifteen, Beth produced several pieces... among them her first self-portrait...a class assignment... and went on to complete two more, the last one finished just months before she died. In looking at these self-portraits it seems as though she had been trying to define who she was and who she was becoming. On her own she explored photography and took some amazing photos. She also created with words through her poetry and prose. She was a member of the Poetry Club, on the Staff of *Sequela* (Naz's Literary Magazine)... a member of the Cable Club and sang in the choir.

She loved her sisters, her German Short-hair Mysty, reading, music and soccer.... especially soccer! Beth was a member of the first soccer team at Nazareth when the school re-instated the girls' soccer program. Beth was also active in her church as an Acolyte and in her community as a Candy Striper at McNeal Hospital. She also participated in her Dad's ministry at the British Home on Sunday mornings; she was loved by the residents there and often accompanied her Dad on visitations to the sick.

With graduation nearing, Beth and her Dad researched several colleges and what caught her interest the most was Bennington College in Bennington, Vermont...a small but prestigious liberal arts institution where she could develop her artistic talents.... And so Elizabeth submitted her portfolio. Beth was killed on March 16, 1995, six weeks before graduation. We received the Acceptance Letter from Bennington several days after her death.
