We enter now the holy season of Lent. A time of 40 days to reflect on, and renew ourselves in, our journey of faith. We follow through these days the path that Jesus took from the wilderness to the cross. I am delighted that you have chosen to join us for this service of worship today. No matter who you are, or where you may be on life's journey, you are welcome here.

We at the Cathedral Church of All Saints, are a diverse lot, from many Christian backgrounds, non-Christian backgrounds, and no faith backgrounds. We come for Christian community, to find God in relationships with neighbours and new friends. We come for lessons from the incredible life of Jesus Christ. We dare to welcome all because God, and not any human authority, extends this gracious invitation. If you wish not to receive Holy Communion you may still come forward for a blessing, simply fold your arms across your chest to receive a blessing. You are also welcomed to remain seated during this time.

In this leaflet, you will find most everything you need to follow along throughout the service. Whether you have been attending the Cathedral Church your whole life or this is your first time here, you are invited to participate in the service as fully as you feel comfortable doing and are able to.

Welcome/Announcements

Territorial Acknowledgement

Leader: As we gather today, we acknowledge, with gratitude, that we do so on the traditional and unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq People. This territory is covered by the "Treaties of Peace and Friendship" which Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik (Maliseet) People first signed with the British Crown in 1725. The treaties did not deal with surrender of lands and resources but in fact recognized Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik (Maliseet) title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.

People: We give thanks for this land and all those who have been stewards of it; for their stories and for their lives – past, present, and future. We commit ourselves to prayerfully seek reconciliation, justice, and healing that we might listen and learn to be faithful stewards of this good land and live in right relationship. We commit ourselves to work for change and put us on the line; to bear responsibility, to take risks, to live powerfully and face humiliation; to stand with those on the edge; to choose life and to be used by the Spirit for God's new community of hope. Amen

Confession and Absolution

Leader Jesus, by your example you challenge us to make this season a journey of discovery; As we leave comforting landmarks behind to inhabit and explore our own uncharted places, help us to discern who we are and embrace what we might become.

Leader God of the liminal places, you draw us into the quietness of the desert so that we can encounter ourselves ...

People But we confess that all too often we stubbornly cling to false images rather than face the necessity of change. **silence/kyrie**

Leader You call us into the emptiness of the desert so that we can confront our desires ...

People But we confess that all too often we continue to choose our own comfort rather than serving the needs of others <u>silence/kyrie</u>

Leader You drive us into the dangers of the desert so that we can engage with your Kingdom ...

People But we confess that all too often we prefer the smooth roads of safety over the perilous pathways of justice **silence/kyrie**

People Forgive us, O God, wherever we have chosen to be, or do, or dare, less than you have asked of us; and as we walk on in the desert with you help us watch and wrestle with these things so that we might choose differently in future.

Leader: For all to whom regret is real,

who seek renewal, God forgives you,

Christ renews you,

and the Holy Spirit enables you to grow in love.

People: Amen.

The Peace

All stand, and the presiding celebrant addresses the people.

Leader: May the peace of God, the comforting peace of familiar presence, the untamed peace of wilderness places, the challenging peace of watching and wrestling, surround and shape your journey onwards. *Leader:* The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And also with you.

The Great Thanksgiving

Presider:The Lord be with you.People:And also with youPresider:Lift up your hearts

People: We lift them up to God.

Presider: Let us give thanks to God.

People: It is right to give both thanks and praise.

Presider: Before going out into the wilderness of the Garden,
Jesus sat down to eat and drink with his friends.
To show them the challenge of the way ahead, and offer them gifts for that journey, he took bread – sustaining and wholesome – and poured wine – earthy and warming – sharing these as signs of his continuing presence with them throughout time to come.
And now, remembering that moment, and recognizing that its promise is also for us, in this time and place, we too break bread
(the bread may be broken)

and pour wine to share with one another (the wine may be poured)

And in that action, we recognize, and affirm with joy, that Christ is present with us now, and throughout time to come; and we join our voices with those of all creation in the unending song of praise:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!

God of the liminal places, send down upon us now, and on these gifts of bread and wine, that same Spirit who drove Jesus into the desert, that we too may be tempered and strengthened by your Presence and refreshed and renewed through your love.

The Breaking of the Bread

The presider breaks the consecrated bread for distribution and invites the people to share in communion and may say,

Presider: The tent side is open,

the table is set.

and God waits for us

to come in from the desert for a while

and be refreshed ...

Presider The gifts of God for the People of God.

The Communion

We invite you to come forward to receive the bread and wine. Please take a cup from the table to receive the wine of the Eucharist, you may leave the cup in the tray as you return to your seat. You are also welcome

to come forward for a prayer of blessing should you choose not to receive. We are happy to come to you at your seat should you desire.

Prayer after Communion

Presider: God has called us

to journey for a season through the wilderness places;

All: And so, as Jesus did before us, we will set out once more to wander in an uncomfortable landscape and wrestle with its challenges, that through the tempering action of the Spirit, we may emerge ready to do the work of the Kingdom.

The Blessing:

Presider: Now go in peace,

do what God wills,

follow where Christ calls, pray for the gifts of the Spirit;

and the blessing of God the Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer rest on, and remain with you, now and always. **Amen.**

All Thanks be to God.




**What is meant by *liminal space*? Liminal space is the uncertain transition between where you've been and where you're going physically, emotionally, spiritually, or metaphorically. To be in a liminal space means to be on the precipice of something new but not quite there yet. The word "liminal" comes from the Latin word "limen," which means threshold.
