From Passover to the Promised Land, from darkness to light, from bondage to freedom, from death to life, the Triduum, the *Great Three Days*, is the most sacred time of the Church's year. We gather together...around a meal, at the foot of the cross, before a pillar of fire. We listen together...to stories of betrayal, abandonment, and rescue. We receive together...holy food and drink, forgiveness and peace from God, reconciliation, and peace with one another.

The Triduum is one service of worship – one liturgy – that we participate in over three days. It has been central to Christian worship for 1800 years. The Triduum is a baptismal journey through all the challenges of life, filled with every possible emotion. It is a journey best made together, as community, because without Christ and one another, we cannot travel this road alone.

No matter how far you've wandered, no matter how long you've been or felt alone, you are welcome here! This is a place of reconciliation, a community of healing, in which those who are broken are made whole by the broken body of Christ. Come and hear. Come and receive. Come and see a place to feel at home and a community where you and your gifts are welcomed, acknowledged, and appreciated. All are welcome!



Confession and Forgiveness

Friends in Christ, in this Lenten season we have heard Christ's call to struggle against sin, death, and the evil one—all that keeps us from loving God and on another. This is the struggle to which we were called in baptism. Within God's beloved community, God never wearies of forgiving and giving peace and reconciliation. Tonight let us confess our sin against God and our neighbor and, reconciled with God and one another, let enter into the celebration of the Great Three Days.

Silence for reflection and selfexamination.

Gracious God,

have mercy on us. We confess that we have turned from you and given ourselves into the power of sin. We are truly sorry and humbly repent. In your compassion forgive us our sins, known and unknown, things we have done and things we have failed to do. Turn us again to you, and uphold us by your Spirit, so that we may live and serve you in newness of life through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

This confession and forgiveness on Maundy Thursday marks the close of Lent. We have sacrificed and fasted for 40 days.

Our annual Passover begins tonight.



The presiding minister announces God's forgiveness.

God, who is rich in mercy, loved us even when we were dead in sin, and made us alive together with Christ. By grace you have been saved. In the name of + Jesus Christ, your sins are forgiven. Almighty God strengthen you with power through the Holy Spirit, that Christ may live in your hearts through faith. **Amen.**


Individual Absolution

People may come to the altar rail and kneel or stand.


The minister, laying both hands on each person, addresses each in turn:



Foot Washing and Prayers

On this night we have heard our Lord's commandment to love one another as he has loved us. We who receive God's love in Jesus Christ are called to love one another, to be servants to each other as Jesus became our servant. Our commitment to this loving service is signified in the washing of feet, following the example our Lord gave us on the night before his death.

During this time, you are invited to participate in one or more expressions of prayer.


- Washing of Feet: Visit one of our foot-washing stations located in two areas around the perimeter of the nave. Please have a seat in one of the chairs, remove your shoes and socks, and be present in sacred space with your foot-washer.
- **Candle-Lighting:** Light candles at one of four spaces near the font or pulpit.
- **Prayers of the People:** Fill out prayer cards in your pew. These will be collected during the offering and stewarded until our Easter Vigil service, where they will be commended to God.
- Community Art: Contribute your fingerprint to a piece of community art begun by artist Cody Jorgensen at a station at the south windows looking out onto our columbarium garden.
- Visio Divina: Latin for "divine seeing," is a method of meditation, reflection, and prayer through a process of intentional seeing. Stop by and reflect on "The Supper at Emmaus" by He Qi in the narthex.


O blest memorial of our dying Lord, who living bread to us shall here afford: oh, may our souls forever feed on thee, and thou, O Christ, forever precious be.







Invitation to the Lord's Table


When we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.




Since this is the first part of a three-day service of worship, there is no final blessing (benediction). The Stripping of the Altar follows, preparing the nave for Good Friday.



In our nave, there are several symbols of Jesus Christ present in the Assembly.

First, the Table, dressed for the holy communion, stripped, just as Jesus was stripped of his garments by Pilate's soldiers. The sacramental vessels, books, linens, and paraments (the hanging on the table) are removed. Then all other related symbols – the pastors' and deacons' stoles, the hanging on the pulpit and other components of worship are removed. The final symbol of the presence of Christ is the Presence Light, which burns 24/7 in a stone pedestal at the back of the nave. This light shows that Christ is present in the elements of Bread and Wine which will not be present in this nave again until holy communion is celebrated at the conclusion of Saturday evening's Easter Vigil. This light is extinguished, the nave is left unadorned and dark and all leave in silence.

The Great Three Days service of worship continues with the Good Friday liturgy tomorrow at 7:00 p.m. This booklet may be taken home or left with the ushers.



Good Friday

April 18, 2025 7:00 p.m.

Gathering

The Holy Spirit calls us together as the people of God.

This is the second and most solemn part of the Great Three Days (the Triduum) for here we remember and participate in the story of Christ's suffering, death, and burial; we pray for the world God so loved for which Christ died; and as we take our place at the cross, we give God thanks for all Christ accomplished for us and all people through the events of this day. The nave – our worship space - remains unadorned and the bells are silent.

All gather in silence.

This profoundly expressive organ work opens our Good Friday liturgy with a sound-world of grief and intensity. Though Bach left no account of why he composed it, scholars have noted that it likely dates from 1720, the year of his first wife's unexpected death. Though we cannot know for certain, many hear in this music an outpouring of private sorrow and grief. As the Three Days continues, this Fantasia draws us into the gravity of the Passion—where love is revealed through suffering, and God is found precisely where God seems most absent.

With roots in the Fourth Century C.E., the Bidding Prayer has had periodic updates. (Example: Islam was not a faith community until the 7th Century C.E. Like all such prayers, there are three parts: A bid – an invitation – offered by an assisting minister. A brief silence for individual/personal prayer. A collect – a summary prayer, led by the presiding minister.

Each collect concludes "...through Christ our Lord," to which the assembly responds: **Amen.**

The prayers conclude:

forever and ever. Amen.

Finally, let us pray for all those things for which our Lord would have us ask.




Procession of the Cross



This parallels and anticipates the way tomorrow evening's Vigil of Easter begins and the cross is replaced by the paschal (Easter) Candle and the three responses are not those below but are instead: The Light of Christ! Thanks be to God!

The assembly faces the cross as it is brought forward.

The following dialogue is sung three times during the procession: at the font, the pulpit, and the table.

Adoration of the Cross

During this time, worshipers are invited to reverence the cross. Acts of reverencing the cross may include approaching the cross and prayerfully touching the cross.



Adoration or veneration of an image or representation of Christ's cross does not mean that we actually adore the material image, but rather what it represents. Because the Cross is inseparable from Christ's great act of love for us, in adoring Christ's Cross we are, in effect, worshiping Christ. At the conclusion of this time, we affirm: We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: By your cross you have redeemed the world.





The Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday will begin in the courtyard at 8:00 p.m. A new Paschal candle is lit, the assembly processes into the nave, and a candlelight vigil of readings and prayers is held. The bells are rung at the return of the "Alleluia" and we gather at the font for Holy Baptism and around the table for the first Holy Communion of Easter.

Jesus Christ, rising in glory, dispels all darkness.

The people gather in the courtyard. The pascal fire is kindled.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. **And also with you.**

The presiding minister welcomes all.

Beloved in Christ, on this most holy night when our Savior Jesus Christ passed from death to life, we gather with the church throughout the world in vigil and prayer. This is the Passover of Jesus Christ. Through light and word, water and oil, bread and cup, we proclaim Christ's death and resurrection, share Christ's triumph over sin and death, and await Christ's coming again in glory. We also commend our Lenten prayers to God, as they are offered to our paschal fire.

Let us pray.

Eternal God, in Jesus Christ you have given the light of life to all the world.

Bless this new fire, and increase in us a desire to shine forth with the brightness of of Christ's rising, until we feast at the banquet of eternal light; through the Sun of righteousness, Jesus Christ our Savior and Lord. Amen.

The paschal fire that is kindled before anything is said. As fire is a source of warmth and light, the new fire of the Easter Vigil represents the victory in Christ of light and life over darkness and death. The Paschal candle, lighted with the new fire, symbolizes the risen Christ. After the lighting of the Paschal candle, a minister carries it and leads the procession to the nave.



By following the Paschal candle, we are reminded of how God led the Hebrew people out of Egypt by a pillar of fire.

Blessing of the Paschal Candle

While the assisting minister holds the Paschal Candle, the presiding minister traces the inscription on it.

Christ, yesterday and today \(\frac{1}{2}\), the beginning and the ending.

Alpha (Λ) and Omega (Ω);

To Christ belongs all time (2);

and all the ages (0);

to Christ belongs glory and dominion (2);

now and forever (5). Amen.

The presiding minister lights the Paschal Candle from the new fire and says:

The light of Christ, rising in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds. **Amen.**

Processional



The Paschal Candle leads the procession around the courtyard into the darkened nave. Along the way, when the Paschal candle is raised, we pause to sing the acclamation.



During the procession, the assembly repeats this chant. Upon entering the nave, the assembly goes to their seats. Standing at the Paschal Candle, the cantor sings the Easter Proclamation.

Easter Proclamation (Exsultet)

Rejoice, heavenly powers!

Sing, choirs of angels! Exult, all creation around God's throne!

Jesus Christ is risen! Celebrate the divine mysteries with exultation;

And for so great a victory, sound the trumpet of salvation!

Rejoice, O earth, in shining splendor, radiant in the brightness of your King!

Christ has conquered! Glory fills you! Darkness vanishes forever!

Rejoice, O holy Church!



The risen Savior shines upon you! Let this place resound with joy, echoing the mighty song of all God's people! This ancient proclamation:


- Invites all to join the cantor's praise;
- Includes a dialogue beginning "The Lord be with you," pointing to the Christ's presence in Holy Communion.
- Recites the history of God's act of compassion and mercy, linking the covenants in both testaments.
- Identifies the Paschal Candle with the Pillar of Fire in the exodus.
- Celebrates <u>everything</u>, even the "happy fault of Adam" in the light of Christ's rising,
- Includes the insertion of five nails, symbolling the wounds from nails and spear wounds of the crucified and risen Christ.
- Concludes with prayer for the peace of Christ's Church and praise to God the Holy Trinity.

During the proclamation, the ministers take light from the Paschal Candle to light the assembly's candles. Also in the midst of the proclamation, this dialogue is sung.

The festive transformation of the church from Lenten austerity to Easter extravagance occurs very quickly now.


