The Resurrection of Jesus Christ: 50 days of Easter Jubilation

Easter, the happy remembrance of the resurrection of the crucified, dead, and buried Jesus Christ, has always been the chief celebration of Christ's Church. *Every Sunday is a celebration of Easter*; a joyous gathering around the festive table where all are welcome to the presence of Christ, crucified and risen.

For our early Christian forbears, celebrating Easter only 52 <u>Sundays</u> was not enough. So they borrowing from their Jewish forebears' observance of Passover and, 50 days later, the spring festival, Shavuot; and using a similar formula: "the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring equinox," they determine the annual <u>day</u> to celebrate Christ's resurrection and added 50 more days to their Easter celebration, concluding with the 50<sup>th</sup> day, Pentecost. In 2025, the Fifty Days of Easter are from April 20 to June 8, and every day, *including weekdays*, is a celebration of Christ's resurrection, our baptism into Christ's dying and rising, and Christ's Spirit-giving presence among us as the holy communion table.

Our forebears had specific suggestions for these 50 days of worship:

- Don't just *bring back* Alleluia, buried and left unheard and unsaid during the 40 weekdays of and Sundays in Lent, sing/shout/ say Alleluia *as often as you can*. Hence, in our worship, we repeat **Alleluia! Christ is risen.**Christ is risen indeed, Alleluia! as often as we are able.
- Remember your baptism into Christ's dying and rising.
   To our forebears, this suggested that they stand (like their Jewish neighbors) for all prayers and acts of worship such as receiving communion during these fifty days. We're going to try this this year.
  - To us, this implied the joyful (and sometimes playful) use of a Thanksgiving for Baptism in place of a more somber Confession and Forgiveness.
- Include as many hymns of praise (especially those with more "Alleluias") as possible. This will be obvious each time we gather to worship.

You are welcome and you are invited to celebrate life in Christ in this beloved community with us. The worship instructions in red (rubrics) will invite you to join in each particular act of jubilation. The notes in green will help us understand the history of each act and why we continue to do them.



# **Kyrie**




# Hymn of Praise

First Reading Acts 9:1-20

<sup>1</sup> Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest <sup>2</sup> and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem.

<sup>3</sup> Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. <sup>4</sup> He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" <sup>5</sup> He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. <sup>6</sup> But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." [<sup>7</sup> The men who were traveling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. <sup>8</sup> Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. <sup>9</sup> For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

<sup>10</sup> Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." He answered, "Here I am, Lord." 11 The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, <sup>12</sup> and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight." <sup>13</sup> But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; 14 and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name." 15 But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; <sup>16</sup> I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name." <sup>17</sup> So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." <sup>18</sup> And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, 19 and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, <sup>20</sup> and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "He is the Son of God."]

"We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

<sup>4</sup> Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. <sup>5</sup> Jesus said to them, "Children, you have no fish, have you?" They answered him, "No." <sup>6</sup> He said to them, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. <sup>7</sup> That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the sea. <sup>8</sup> But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

<sup>9</sup> When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. <sup>10</sup> Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." <sup>11</sup> So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. <sup>12</sup> Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they knew it was the Lord. <sup>13</sup> Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. <sup>14</sup> This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.



The Nicene Creed celebrates its 1700 anniversary in May 2025.
Recognizing this, the Lutheran World Federation and the Orthodox communion suggest that in solidarity through the 50 days of Easter which we are celebrating at the same time, we omit the words "and the Son," marked in gray which is a later addition.

As a sign of our Easter joy, please remain standing.

# **Great Thanksgiving**

The presiding minister invites the Assembly's joyful thanksgiving. In the "proper preface" beginning with "It is indeed right, our duty and our joy," the presiding minister celebrates the "death of our foe" and the gift of the holy communion meal which we receive from God through Christ "the Paschal (Passover) Lamb."







# The presiding minister continues in thanksgiving and intercession.

You are indeed holy, O God, the fountain of all holiness; you bring light from darkness, life from death, speech from silence. We worship you for our lives and for the world you give us. We thank you for the new world to come and for the love that will rule all in all.

We praise you for the grace shown to Israel, your chosen, the people of your promise:
the rescue from Egypt, the gift of the promised land, the memory of the forebears, the homecoming from exile, and the prophets' words that will not be in vain.

In all this we bless you for your only-begotten Son, who fulfilled and will fulfill all your promises.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying:
This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin.
Do this for the remembrance of me.

For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Therefore, O God, with this bread and cup
we remember the incarnation of your Son:
his human birth and the covenant he made with us.
We remember the sacrifice of his life:

his eating with outcasts and sinners, and his acceptance of death. But chiefly we remember his rising from the tomb, his ascension to the seat of power,

and his sending of the holy and life-giving Spirit.

We cry out for the resurrection of our lives, when Christ will come again in beauty and power to share with us the great and promised feast.

Amen. Come, Lord Jesus.

Send now, we pray, your Holy Spirit,
that we and all who share in this bread and cup
may be united in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit,
may enter the fullness of the kingdom of heaven,
and may receive our inheritance with all your saints in light.

Amen. Come, Holy Spirit.

Join our prayers with those of your servants of every time and every place, and unite them with the ceaseless petitions of our great high priest until he comes as victorious Lord of all.

All honor and glory are yours, almighty God, through Christ Jesus, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. **Amen.**

Invitation to the Christ's Table


Come to the table of grace. Receive the gift of new life.




# Sending of the Lay Eucharistic Ministers
