SUNDAYS AFTER PENTECOST, FOLLOWING JESUS, PRACTICING DISCIPLESHIP

Of the 52 possible Sundays each year, 30 are found in two "seasons:" Sundays after Epiphany (January 12 -March 2, this year) and Sundays after Pentecost (June 15-November 23, this year). Some also call these Sundays "ordinary time." The ministers' vestments and altar and pulpit hangings are green on these Sundays.

Sundays after Epiphany and Sundays after Pentecost are connected (hence, the same liturgical color) and, though interrupted by Lent and Easter, are marked by a continuous in-order reading of the Gospel appointed for the year. This year is known as series C and the Gospel we read this year is the Gospel of Luke.

Each of these seasons begins and concludes with festival Sundays. Sundays after Epiphany beginning with the Baptism of Jesus and conclude with Jesus' Transfiguration. Sundays after Pentecost begin with Holy Trinity Sunday and conclude with Christ the King Sunday. All four of these days use white vestments.

On each of these Sundays, the first reading from the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament) and Psalm have been chosen to relate directly to the gospel reading. The second readings, however, are chosen to also be continuous inorder readings of other New Testament books. This year, the second readings will begin with Galatians 2 (June 15) and continue through Colossians, Hebrews, Philemon, 1 and 2 Timothy, and 2 Thessalonians.

Another occasion or holy day may be substituted for a particular Sunday after Pentecost. This summer, there are two such interruptions. On June 29, we will observe the Day of Peter and Paul and on the same day commemorate Pride Sunday. The color on this day will be red for the two apostles and there will be three Prayers of the Day: The first for the occasion (Pride); the second for the day (Peter & Paul); and the third for the week (3rd Sunday after Pentecost).

On August 17, we will celebrate the Day of Mary, Mother of God. The color will be white and there will be two Prayers of the Day: for the Day (Mary), and for the week (10th Sunday after Pentecost).

First Reading

Acts 12:1-11

God rescues Peter from prison

¹ About that time King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. ² He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. ³ After he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread.) ⁴ When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. ⁵ While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him.

⁶ The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. ⁷ Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, "Get up quickly." And the chains fell off his wrists. ⁸ The angel said to him, "Fasten your belt and put on your sandals." He did so. Then he said to him, "Wrap your cloak around you and follow me." ⁹ Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. ¹⁰ After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. ¹¹ Then Peter came to himself and said, "Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting."

Second Reading

Galatians 5:1, 13-25

Love is the whole law, gift of the Spirit

¹ For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

¹³ For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. ¹⁴ For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ¹⁵ If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

¹⁶ Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. ¹⁷ For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. ¹⁸ But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. ¹⁹ Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, ²⁰ idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, ²¹ envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

²² By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. ²⁴ And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. ²⁵ If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.






Invitation to the Christ's Table


The kingdom of God is set before you. Eat and rejoice.
