REFLECT Acts 9:17-31

- What role did Ananias play in Saul's transformation?
- What do you think Barnabas saw in Saul?
 - o In your opinion why was Barnabas different than the other disciples—unafraid of Saul?
- Saul begins preaching boldly despite opposition. What does this say about the kind of encouragement that fuels courage—not comfort?
- Who has been an "Ananias" or "Barnabas" for you—someone who saw your potential and encouraged you forward?
- In Acts 9:31 we see that the church grew. This was due to what factors?

RESPOND

- Saul preached boldly despite threats. What message or truth are you being called to share with courage, even if it's uncomfortable?
- How will you encourage someone in your family today?
