Nov 23 | Jeremiah 29:1, 4-14

Read Jeremiah 29:1, 4-14, and then spend time reflecting on the following questions:

Reflect: The exiles longed for a quick return home, but God's word to them was unexpected: build houses, plant gardens, seek the good of the place where you are. God promised a future, but also called them to live faithfully in the waiting. We often want God to move faster, to fix what's broken right away. Yet in the waiting, God is still at work, shaping us, sustaining us, and planting seeds of hope that will one day bear fruit.

When have you felt "in exile," longing for something to change? What practices help you trust God's work in seasons of waiting?
