

The 14th Sunday after Pentecost *The Season of Creation*September 14, 2025



Today on this 'Welcome Back' Sunday, we honour the memory of Howard D'Arcy May 20, 1939 – June 10, 2025

A beloved teacher at J.L. Ilsley High School for 24 years, Howard was also an actor appearing in local films, including *Three Days, Roller Town*, and *Those Forgotten*. An avid historian Howard often provided displays for the Cathedral including our role in the Titanic disaster and an annual centerpiece of historic reflection for Remembrance Sunday. Howard also served as the Verger here at All Saints for more than a decade. Modest, humble, and unassuming, Howard's request was not to have a published obituary or public funeral, but his ashes were interred here in the Cathedral earlier this summer. His plaque reads: *We are all visitors to this place. We are just passing through. Our purpose here is to observe, to learn, to grow, to love, and then we return home.*

Howard's ministry of welcome, as a greeter and parishioner, was genuine and all encompassing. Many people recall Howard as their first introduction to our Cathedral community. "Now who are you?" or, "I don't think I've met you before" Howard would begin with his smile of greeting. On this *Welcome Back Sunday*, we are asking everyone to fill out a name tag, and a simple statement as a conversation starter. Let us together continue the tradition of welcome and hospitality Howard taught us so well.



I am delighted to have you with us today for this service of worship. Please, stay awhile. Get to know us better. No matter who you are, or where

you are on life's journey, you are welcome here.

We at All Saints Cathedral Church, are a diverse lot, from many Christian backgrounds, non-Christian backgrounds, and no faith backgrounds. We come for Christian community, to find God in relationships with neighbours and new friends. We come for lessons from the incredible life of Jesus Christ. We come for spiritual rest, time to think, pray, and center on God, for comfort in hard times, and gratitude in good times. We come to serve God, each other, and the world. We're not perfect. We trust in God's gentle grace and unconditional love. We seek meaning for the life God has gifted us.

You are invited to God's table to receive communion (gluten free wafers are available). We welcome you, no matter who you are, or what you look like, or what labels the world puts on you. We welcome you if, like us, you struggle with flaws and imperfection but have a loving spirit and strive to let the light of Jesus shine within you and then to share it with others. We dare to welcome all because God, and not any human authority, extends this gracious invitation. If you wish not to receive Holy Communion you may still come forward for a blessing, simply fold your arms across your chest to receive a blessing. You are also welcomed to remain seated during this time.

In this leaflet, you will find most everything you need to follow along throughout the service. Whether you have been attending the Cathedral Church your whole life or this is your first time here, you are invited to participate in the service as fully as you feel comfortable doing and are able to.

Welcome

Territorial Acknowledgement

Leader: As we gather today, we acknowledge, with gratitude, that we do so on the traditional and unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq People. This territory is covered by the "Treaties of Peace and Friendship" which Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik (Maliseet) People first signed with the British Crown in 1725. The treaties did not deal with surrender of lands and resources but in fact recognized Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik (Maliseet) title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.

People: We give thanks for this land and all those who have been stewards of it; for their stories and for their lives – past, present, and future. We commit ourselves to prayerfully seek reconciliation, justice, and healing that we might listen and learn to be faithful stewards of this good land and live in right relationship.

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

The First Reading

Reader A reading from the prophet Jeremiah [4:11-12, 22-28]

At that time it will be said to this people and to Jerusalem: A hot wind comes from me out of the bare heights in the desert toward my poor people, not to winnow or cleanse-- a wind too strong for that. Now it is I who speak in judgment against them. "For my people are foolish, they do not know me; they are stupid children, they have no understanding. They are skilled in doing evil, but do not know how to do good." I looked on the earth, and lo, it was waste and void; and to the heavens, and they had no light. I looked on the mountains, and lo, they were quaking, and all the hills moved to and fro. I looked, and lo, there was no one at all, and all the birds of the air had fled. I looked, and lo, the fruitful land was a desert, and all its cities were laid in ruins before the LORD, before his fierce anger. For thus says the LORD: The whole land shall be a desolation: yet I will not make a full end. Because of this the earth shall mourn, and the heavens above grow black; for I have spoken, I have purposed; I have not relented nor will I turn back.

I am grateful to Christ Jesus our Lord, who has strengthened me, because he judged me faithful and appointed me to his service, even though I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and a man of violence. But I received mercy because I had acted ignorantly in unbelief, and the grace of our Lord overflowed for me with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners-- of whom I am the foremost. But for that very reason I received mercy, so that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display the utmost patience, making me an example to those who would come to believe in him for eternal life. To the King of the ages,

immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

So he told them this parable: "Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? When he has found it, he lavs it on his shoulders and rejoices. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.' Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance. He suffered under Pontius Pilate. was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints. the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body. and the life everlasting. Amen.

The Season of Creation



Each year from September 1 to October 4, the Christian family unites for this worldwide celebration of prayer and action to protect

our common home. The celebration of this Season began in 1989 when Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios I established September 1 as a Day of Prayer for Creation for the Orthodox Church. The World Council of Churches extended the celebration to October 4th, the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi. It is a special season where we celebrate God as Creator and acknowledge Creation as the divine continuing act that summons us as collaborators to love and care for the gift of all that is created. As followers of Christ from around the globe, we share a common call to care for Creation. We are co-creatures and part of all that God has made. Our wellbeing is interwoven with the well-being of the Earth. The Season of Creation 2025 logo, titled "Garden of Peace," depicts a white dove carrying an olive branch over a tree, with one side of the landscape barren and the other flourishing. Inspired by Isaiah 32:14-18, the symbol illustrates the transition from a damaged environment to a fertile one, reflecting the theme "Peace with Creation" and the connection between environmental care and peace. We rejoice in this opportunity to safeguard our common home and all beings who share it.
